# GOD LOVE YOU!

One of our major tasks in the Missions is the perfecting in Christ of the Moslems. 375,000,000 of them stretch from Russia through Northern Africa into Indonesia and China. They believe in God and even in the Blessed Virgin, but they have borne a long hatred against the Person of Christ. In one city last year, a Moslem woman was converted to the Faith; thereupon the whole city went on strike — no railroads were delivered, all stores were closed and streets refused to operate.

We have recently come across the writings of a Moslem visionary, Shelk Ahmed of Medina, who lived around the year 1200. He prophesied that in the year 1962 women would go out of their houses without the permission of their husbands. This clearly refers to the emancipation of women in Moslem lands — an emancipation which has already taken place in Turkey and which is doubtless being materialized by 1962. "In the year 1972," he said, "a sign will appear in the sky like the egg of a hen". A professor in Baghdad interpreted this as the smoke of some great atomic explosion. Twenty years later, or in 1991 "the Gates of Mercy will be shut", which means that it will be too late for sinners to repent. Our Lady in her Revelation of Salette said somewhat the same thing: "The arm of my Divine Son has grown heavy; and I cannot much longer restrain It."

Shelk Ahmed then prophesied that in the year 2002 the Koran will disappear. The readers in the mosques will find only blank pages in their copies, and what they have learned by heart they will no longer remember. Moslemism will be destroyed. "Jesus, the Son of Mary, will then come from heaven, and there will be the final Armageddon, when the enemies of the Faith will be destroyed and all imperfect forms of religion will disappear, and Christ will establish his eternal reign."

Remember that this is only a Moslem prophecy and has no intrinsic religious worth, nor is it to be believed. We quote it only because it is an independent non-Christian testimony showing how a Moslem believed Moslemism would disappear at the end of the world. But it does have this lesson for us: We live in apocalyptic times. Each hour is to be lived St. Paul tells us as if it were fraught with judgment. The time that is given to us we will use to perfect our souls; the good given to us we will sacrifice that the love of God may spread to all peoples before the Day of Wrath. Deny yourself luxury and send it to us and we will send it to the Holy Father for his missions.

## Noted Jesuit Historian Named Auriesville Rector

The Rev. William J. Schlaerth, S.J., a native of Buffalo, was designated rector of Our Lady of Martyrs Tertiarianship and the Sacred Heart Retreat House for Priests at Auriesville, and the National Shrine of the North American Martyrs in the Diocese of Albany, according to the Very Rev. Thomas E. Hennebery, S.J., Provincial of the New York Province of the Society of Jesus.

The appointment was made by the Very Rev. John B. Janssens, S.J., General of the Society of Jesus, in Rome (Italy).

The Shrine of the North American Martyrs is on the site of Ossemeron, the Iroquois Indian village where America's first canonized martyr, the Jesuit St. John de Sola, Rensselaer and John Lalands were tomahawked over 300 years ago.

It is also the birthplace of Venerable Kateri Tekakwitha, the "Lily of the Mohawk," who is being considered for canonization by the Church.

THE TERTIARIANSHIP, the Retreat House for Priests and the Shrine will come under the supervision and administration of Father Schlaerth.

Father Schlaerth received his early schooling at Holy Name of Jesus School, East Buffalo, and Canisius High School, and entered the Society of Jesus at Woodstock-on-Hudson, Yonkers, in 1921.

Noviceship at Woodstock and two years of classical studies at Shadowbrook, Mass. were followed by a three-year course in philosophy at Western College, Mass. where he obtained his A.B. (1927) and M.A. (1928) degrees.

From 1928 to 1931 Father Schlaerth was an instructor in history at Loyola College, Baltimore, Md.

In 1931 Father Schlaerth was assigned to Woodstock College, Md. for theology. He was ordained a priest on June 24, 1934.

After teaching history in the Jesuit house of studies at Wernersville, Pa., Father Schlaerth was sent to Europe in 1936 to begin four years of historical studies. After a year in Austria, he went to Rome for studies in Church history at the famed Gregorian University. He made his solemn profession of vows in the Jesuit Order in Valkenburg, Holland, in 1938.

ENGAGED in historical research in the archives of the British museum, Father Schlaerth was in London when World War II began, but was able to return to Rome for completion of his work for a doctorate degree, which he received in history from the Gregorian University in 1940.

Since his return to the United States in 1940, Father Schlaerth has held many key posts. He was dean of the Graduate School and associate professor of history at Canisius College, Buffalo (1940-1944), during which period he coordinated the nursing program for all the Catholic nursing schools in the Buffalo area and prepared the program of the present B.S. in nursing at Canisius College.

Sent to Fordham University, Bronx, N.Y. in 1944 as associate professor of Medieval History in the Graduate School there, Father Schlaerth was editor of the Fordham University Studies and University representative of the Fordham University Press.

In 1947 he was designated president of LaMoigne College, Syracuse, N.Y., where he was responsible for the building of one of the newest of the 28 Jesuit colleges and universities in this country.

Since 1954 he has been professor of history at Canisius College and director of Sodalties at the two Catholic women's colleges in Buffalo, D'Youville and Rosary Hill.
