

Vice Principal, Assistant Superior Named At Aquinas

Appointment of the Rev. Leon Hart, C.S.B., as vice principal of Aquinas Institute, and the Rev. W. O. Regan, C.S.B., as assistant superior of the Basilian Fathers who staff the boys' high school was announced today.

Appointments to St. John Fisher College and Aquinas were made by the Very Rev. George B. Fialliff, C.S.B., Toronto, superior general of the Basilian Fathers.

Father Hart, a native Rochesterian, is an alumnus of Aquinas and has been a member of the teaching staff for two years. He also taught at Aquinas while a seminarian.

Father Regan, director of the English department, came to Rochester in 1937 when the Basilian Fathers assumed direction of Aquinas.

APPOINTED TO the staff of St. John Fisher College are the Rev. Daniel Burns, C.S.B., the Rev. John McCreavy, C.S.B., and the Rev. Peter Sheehan, C.S.B., and the Rev. John Cavanaugh, C.S.B. Father Cavanaugh is a native of Rochester and a graduate of Aquinas Institute.

Leaving the men's college are the Rev. Gerard A. Pilecki, C.S.B., Rochesterian who has been appointed to graduate studies at Cornell University, and the Rev. David Belyea, C.S.B., transferred to St. Michael's College, Toronto.

Assigned to the staff of Aquinas are the Reverend Fathers John Cherry, Frederick Sohn, Edward Deser, Robert Chauvin and John Kraus, Rochesterians. Father Sohn and Deser have just completed their course of study in theology at St. Basil's Seminary, Toronto.

Leaving Aquinas are the Rev. Robert Fichette, C.S.B., also a Rochesterian, who has been vice principal since 1950. Other Basilian Fathers leaving the local boys' school are the Reverend Fathers John T. Conway, Leo V. McGrady, Arthur Waligore and Albert Williams.

Listed in the appointments is a new foundation of the Basilian Fathers, St. Mary's College, located at Sault Ste. Marie, Ont. The assignments also show that the Basilians have resumed charge of the College Sacre Coeur in Annonay, France as a result of the union of the North American order with that in France last year.

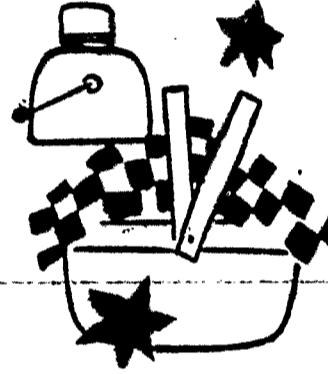

St. Ann Novena Planned By Passionists

St. Ann's Passionist Monastery in Scranton, Pennsylvania, will be the site of another solemn annual novena to honor Saint Ann upon her Feast Day, July 26. This novena has grown to national proportions since the initial solemn novena in 1924.

Confessions are heard practically all day long in Italian, Polish, Lithuanian, German and Slovak. From 8:30 until 9:30, daily almost 45 Masses are offered; on the main altars, 12 Masses are offered almost each half hour, when Holy Communion is distributed to over 100,000.

The preachers of this year's novena will be Rev. Dominic Grande, C.P., and Rev. Bernard Tierney, C.P. Father Dominic is stationed in our Lady of Sorrows Monastery in West Springfield, Mass. He is a veteran missionary and a renowned preacher. For 28 years, he has conducted missions, retreats and novenas in both Italian and English speaking parishes.

Father Bernard is assistant to the director of Laymen's Retreats at the Immaculate Conception Monastery, Jamaica, Long Island. Before this appointment he was engaged upon the missions and in retreat work. He is a native of the parish of St. Ann's, a graduate of that high school and a former choir-boy, when he, too, used to make novenas in honor of Good St. Ann.

Three Events Set To Mark Feast At Mt. Saviour

On Wednesday, July 11, the Solemnity of St. Benedict, Mount Saviour Monastery will celebrate three events: the 25th anniversary of the monastic profession of Father Peter Minard, the solemn profession of Brother James Kelly at the Benedictine Abbey of Monte Cassino in Italy, and the solemn profession of Brother Laurence Duffy at Mount Saviour.

A native of France, Father Peter Minard was born at Le Mans and studied at a Jesuit school there. Later he studied civil law at the University of Paris from which he holds a degree, and at the Sorbonne he studied medieval history.

Father Minard is a recognized scholar in the field of liturgical manuscripts and has contributed articles on monastic history and liturgy to various periodicals in France, Belgium, Italy, Canada and the U.S.

He started his monastic life in 1929 at the Benedictine Abbey of Liguge in France where he made his solemn profession in 1931, the 25th anniversary of which is now to be celebrated. At Liguge, he served several years as librarian and for a short period in 1939 as Master of Novices.

It was in this latter position during the years 1947-1953 at the Abbey of St. Benoit-du-Lac, Quebec, Canada that Father Minard became acquainted with Mount Saviour. The novices of Mount Saviour had at one time to be sent to the Canadian Abbey for their year of novitiate. In December of 1954, Father Minard came to Mount Saviour where he instructed the novices in the Rule of St. Benedict, liturgy, holy scripture, Latin and monastic history, and in his "spare time" expertly plows the fields of Mount Saviour.

In a ceremony at Monte Cassino Abbey, to be celebrated by the Most Rev. Ildelfonso Rea, O.S.B., Archbishop of Monte Cassino, Brother James Kelly will take his final vows; he is the third member of the community to do so this year.

From Danville, N. Y., Brother James came to Mount Saviour in 1931. In 1954, he was sent to

Rome with three other members of the community to study for the priesthood at the Benedictine College of San Anselmo in Rome. His solemn profession will be made in the presence of Father Gregory Borgstedt, Subprior of Mount Saviour, who is serving as Chaplain to a pilgrimage group visiting various shrines in Europe.

Brother James' profession will take place at the "cradle" of Benedictine monasticism, Monte Cassino having the distinction of being founded by St. Benedict at the beginning of the 6th Century.

At 3:30 p.m., before Vespers, next Wednesday, Brother Laurence Duffy will make his simple profession, when, after having completed his one year of novitiate, he indicates his willingness to give up a worldly career for monastic life and promise stability in the Monastery, conversion of life and obedience.

From his home in Hadley, Mass., his parents will come to attend the ceremonies, which will be conducted by the Very Reverend Damasius Winzen, Prior of Mount Saviour; the public is also invited to attend.
