Father Cosgrove Returns From Rome; Offers First Mass In U.S. At Hornell

Hornell—First Solemn Mass in the United States after returning from his ordination in Rome was celebrated by the Rev. William J. Cosgrove at St. Ignatius Loyola Church, his home parish on Sunday, July 8 at 11 a.m.

After studying at St. Andrew's and St. Bernard's Seminaries, Father Cosgrove went to the North American College in Rome for advanced studies and was ordained by Bishop Martin O'Connor, rector of the college in the chapel on Dec. 17, 1955.

In his first Mass home, the Rev. James R. Cosgrove, the newly ordained priest's brother, was Deacon and the Rev. Joseph E. Smith, newly appointed assistant pastor of St. Ann Church, Hornell, was Subdeacon. Assistant Priest was the Rev. Joseph M. McDonnell, pastor of St. Ignatius Loyola Church, here.

SERMON WAS preached by the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Richard K. Burns, former vice rector of the North American College in Rome. Monsignor Burns emphasized the sacred obligation a priest assumes when, through the Sacrament of Holy Orders, he becomes an emissary of Christ, the High Priest, to carry out His Orders.

At the Mass also were the Rt. Rev. Msgr. John E. Maney, chancellor of the Rochester Diocese; the Rev. David Murphy, professor at St. Andrew's Seminary; the Rev. Robert McManara, professor at St. Bernard's Seminary; the Rev. James F. Slattery of Corning; the Rev. Paul E. Gibbons, professor at St. Andrew's Seminary; the Rev. Leo J. Mans and the Rev. Norbert Nolan of Hornell and Frater James Knight, O.F.M. of Washington, D.C.

Father McDonnell was toastmaster at a dinner following Mass in the American Legion Home, Seneca St. which was attended by 65 relatives and out of town guests.

MORE THAN 1000 persons attended a reception also at the American Legion Home from 3 to 6 p.m. Thirty priests were present. At Father Cosgrove's side were his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Ray E. Cosgrove of 105 Hill St. Hornell.

Degrees Conferred On 3 At Catholic U.

Three young women of the Diocese of Rochester received degrees from the School of Social Science of the Catholic University of America at Washington, D.C.

Appointment of two vice chairmen to assist Judge Daniel J. Donahoe in the St. Joseph Hospital Building Fund Campaign in Elmira and Chemung County from Oct. 27 to Dec. 18 was announced today by Judge Donahoe, general chairman.

The campaign will be for funds for a new six-story wing to adjoin the present hospital building on East Market Street. Working drawings are now being prepared by the Elmira architectural firm of Haskell, Considine, Haskell.

NAMED WERE vice chairmen Norman J. Learned, president of LeValley McLeod, Inc., and Charles Kennedy, president of Kennedy Valve Company who will assist the general chairman in developing an organization sufficiently large to give every employed person in the County an opportunity to share in the Campaign.

Learned has been an active and prominent leader in the community's business and civic life for more than 30 years. His community work, among others, includes service as a trustee of Elmira College and a director of St. Joseph's Hospital.

In the business field he also serves as a director of the Marine Midland Trust Company of Southern New York, and is also president of the Van Gylsire Realty Company. Presently Mr. Learned is president of the Elmira Industries, Inc.

Kennedy is a native of Elmira, and in addition to being president of his own company he is also president of the Semler Company, Jeannette, Pa. Kennedy is a trustee of the Elmira Savings Bank, St. Joseph's Hospital, Elmira College, and a director and vice-president of the Empire State Chamber of Commerce, and a member of the Valve Manufacturer's Association.

IN ADDITION to assisting with the over-all organization, Learned also accepted the Chairmanship of the Advance Gifts Division, which will have approximately 150 volunteers, who will contact approximately 750 potential contributors prior to the official launching of the public phase of the Campaign.

Kennedy also has accepted additional responsibilities and will act as Chairman of the Corporate Division. He will enlist enough volunteers as co-workers so that each industrial corporation in the County will be personally contacted and asked to contribute according to the usage of the Hospital by their employees and dependents. This will be worked out on a formula basis which is now being prepared.

Judge Donahoe said, "I am glad to know that these two men have agreed to accept the Chairmanship of these important divisions, and am confident that their leadership will mean much toward the success of the Campaign."

He further said that chairmen for the other divisions in the Organization, which are Business and Professional, Medical Staff, Hospital Family, Clubs and Organizations, Industrial Employees, Metropolitan and Allied Towns and an Auditor and Treasurer, will be selected at an early date, and each chairman will have the responsibility of building an organization within his or her division.

When the Organization is completed, there will be between 3,000 and 3,500 volunteers working in behalf of the Building Program.

Capuchin Known In Diocese Sent To Guam Mission

The Rev. Christian Schembri, O.F.M., Cap., of St. Fidelis Friary, Interlaken, N. Y., has been assigned to the mission of Guam, Marianas Islands. During the past year, Father Christian has conducted missions, retreats and novenas in Canada and the Eastern States including this diocese.

Father Christian is a member of the Saint Fidelis Mission Band of the Capuchin - Franciscan Province of New York.

THE MARIANAS are a group of 17 islands 5,000 miles west of San Francisco, Guam, the largest of the group is only 30 miles long and 8 miles wide. Its 400,000 natives are 95% Catholic. Other islands of the group are Salpan, Rota, and Tinian. Bishop Apollinaris Baumgartner, O.F.M., Cap., is Vicar Apostolic of the Islands.

The Capuchin Fathers established the friary at Interlaken, in 1851. Since that time they have been engaged in various apostolic works in our diocese; such as, preaching, assisting in parishes, and serving as chaplains to hospitals.

St. John's To House Two-Year Course Of Friars' New Seminary

Montour Falls—Foundation of the St. Pius X Seminary of the Franciscan Friars of the Atonement who conduct St. John's Atonement Seminary here, was effected on June 29 when the Board of Regents of the State of New York granted a provisional charter for five years, according to the Rev. Wilfrid Brennan, S.A., rector of St. John's.

St. Pius X Seminary will comprise the four years of the college program for seminarians studying for the Holy Priesthood in the Franciscan Friars of the Atonement.

The first two years of this program, the classical studies, will be conducted at Montour Falls, the last two years, the philosophical studies, will be conducted at Saranac Lake. Thus the new St. Pius X Seminary will have two distinct campuses, one here at Montour Falls, and the other at Saranac Lake.

FUTURE PLANS, Father Brennan said, call for unification of these separate units into one location, probably at Graymoor, Garrison, N. Y., location of the Motherhouse of the Franciscan Friars of the Atonement.

St. John's Atonement Seminary will continue to operate at Montour Falls as the preparatory department for the new St. Pius X Seminary.

The Friars of the Atonement came to the Diocese of Rochester in November, 14 and His Excellency Bishop Kearney presided at dedication of the Seminary in the former Cook Academy building on Nov. 2, 1949.

Marie Curry, State CDA Leader, Dies

Known widely in the Diocese of Rochester because of many appearances at Catholic Daughters of America functions, Miss Marie C. Curry, of Belgrade, Long Island, a national director and New York State Regent died in Good Samaritan Hospital, Portland, Ore., July 7, 1956.

Miss Curry was attending a directors' meeting in Portland preceding the organization's national convention when stricken on July 4. She was found in her hotel room by Mrs. Irene Hayward, Long Branch, N. J., a travelling companion.

In May of this year, Miss Curry presided at the 25th biennial state convention of the CDA held at Marie-Twin-Hotel, Elmira. During her term as state regent from 1948 to now she had taken part in local court activities in various sections of the diocese.

One of Miss Curry's principal contributions to the work of the Catholic Daughters of America in New York state was the organization of a "seminarian fund" through which the Archbishops and Bishops of the five dioceses in New York received financial aid for the training of students for the priesthood. Almost \$100,000 has been given for this purpose.

His Holiness Pope Pius XII awarded Miss Curry the papal medal Pro Ecclesia et Pontifice in 1948.

Archbishop Thomas E. Molloy, Bishop of Brooklyn, was scheduled to preside at the funeral Mass at St. Gregory's Church, Bellerose. Archbishop Molloy is state chaplain for the Catholic Daughters of America in New York.
