Watertown Site Acquired For Franciscan Brothers

Syracuse, N. Y. — (NC) — A 65-acre tract of land known as the Jefferson County Farm School property on the outskirts of Watertown, N.Y., has been acquired by the

Order of Franciscan Friars Minor here and will be converted into a training school for Franciscan Brothers. It has been announced.

Father Francis Edie, O.F.M., the community provincial, said the property was acquired through a \$22,600 bid to the Watertown City Board of Education. The tract contains four buildings, including a gymnasium built about five years ago.

Officials of the Watertown education board estimated that the property, located about three miles outside the city, is worth in excess of \$100,000.

Father Edie said there will be no extensive renovations made to the property during the first few years but that plans call for opening a monastery there in September.

Besides the gym, the property includes an administration building, a two-story dormitory with accommodations for a two-story school, and a four-car garage. It also has a barn and poultry house.

760,000 Communions Given In Boston
Boston — (NC) — Some 760,000 Holy Communions were distributed in the Archdiocese of Boston during a four-day Eucharistic Crusade held here.

The committee for the crusade, which ran from the feast of Corpus Christi (May 31) to June 3, called the event a "tremendous success." Regular church services, special evening Masses, Holy Hours, expositions of the Blessed Sacrament, processions and lectures on the Eucharist were held in archdiocesan parishes.

Priest, 95, Marks 75th Anniversary
Akron, Ohio — (NC) — Msgr. Ferdinand A. Schreiber, whose life as a priest spans three generations of the Church in the United States, celebrated here his 95th birthday and the 75th anniversary of his ordination.

He is pastor emeritus of St. Bernard parish. He is believed to be the oldest diocesan priest in the United States.

In honor of the double anniversary Pope Plus last week sent his apostolic blessing to the venerable priest.

Hibernians Plan National Convention In New York City, Order's Birthplace
The national convention of the Ancient Order of Hibernians in America scheduled in New York City from August 6 to 10 and climaxing the 120th anniversary celebration of the order is expected to attract members of the AOH and Auxiliary from this area.

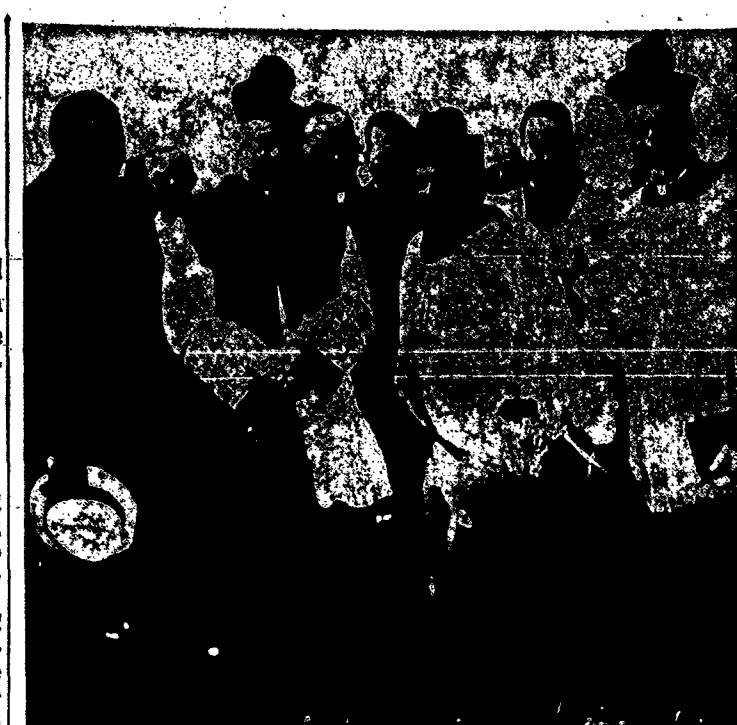
It will be the order's first national convention in its birthplace in some 55 years. It was May, 1836, when a small group of Irish immigrants met in the basement of St. James' church in Manhattan. There they received the charter sent from Ireland, that authorized formation of the AOH in America.

Present-day Hibernians say that in spirit they trace their origin far back into ages past, to those orders into which the people of Ireland were divided in earliest times: the Bards, or singers; the Druids, or priests; the Brehons, or judges and lawyers; the Oillams, or historians; and the Knights and Soldiers, defenders of the country.

EARLY YEARS of the AOH in America were at times stormy. The local division halls in New York were havens for the vast wave of Irish immigrants which came during the 1830's and 1840's. Soon after its founding, the AOH was confronted with a whirlwind of anti-Catholic and anti-Irish bigotry. Mobs sometimes roamed the streets, attacking Catholics and breaking windows in the churches.

Archbishop John Hughes of New York asked members of the AOH to protect the sacred edifices. The Hibernians armed themselves and garrisoned the churches. In 1844 members of Know-Nothing Party marched on old St. Patrick's Cathedral, in lower Manhattan, but were beaten off by a band of AOH defenders.

Through the years the AOH in America has always supported Irish national movements and has given aid to the old country in times of famine and other economic emergencies. The Hi-

Spanish Primate Alerts Catholic Press

Madrid — (RNS) — Enrique Cardinal Pla y Deniel, Archbishop of Toledo and Primate of Spain, declared that an alert Catholic press is vitally necessary in order to present a Catholic interpretation of current events.

The cardinal's statement was released in connection with the observance of Catholic Press Day during which collections in support of Catholic publications were taken up in many churches over the country.

Cardinal Pla said it was a matter of rejoicing that Spain had no anti-religious press. But he added that the secular press carried reports which often were inadequately handled or interpreted from the Catholic viewpoint.

Spain Bishop Asks Priests For S.A.
Madrid — (RNS) — Roman Catholic Bishop Eduardo Martinez y Gonzalez of Zamora has warned that unless more priests are sent to Latin America that area "will be largely lost to the Church within 25 years."

The bishop spoke to a group of seminarians in the Zamora diocese. He said that Spain has 30,000 priests and religious and nearly 9,000 seminarians and must urgently "send many thousands of Spanish priests" to "save the situation in Latin America."

Byzantine Bishop Gets Pope's Praise
Vatican City — (NC) — His Holiness Pope Plus XII received Byzantine Rite Bishop George Calavassy, Apostolic Exarch of Athens, on the occasion of the prelate's golden anniversary as a priest.

The Holy Father commended Bishop Calavassy for the many activities which he has carried out in the interest of Byzantine Rite Catholics in the United States, Holland, France, Belgium, Switzerland and Greece.

He was entertained at the Pontifical Greek College, here, where he lived as a student for eight years. He was honored at a reception attended by many prelates of the Sacred Congregation for the Oriental Church.

Bishop Calavassy was born in Syria, Greece, on February 2, 1881. He was consecrated titular Bishop of Teodoropolis and became Apostolic Exarch on August 15, 1920.

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
