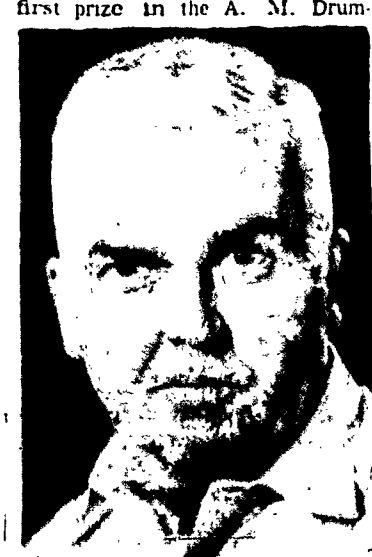

Dean-Seligman Nuptials Held

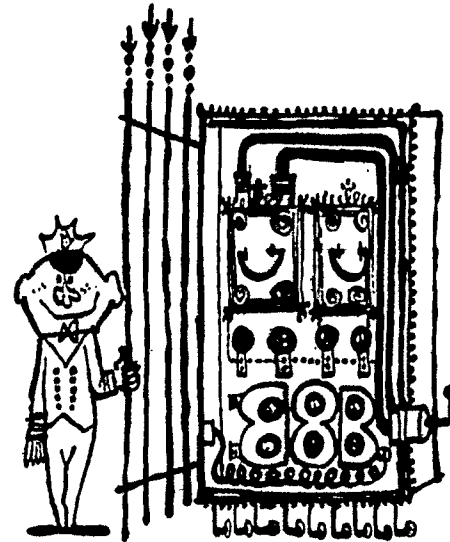

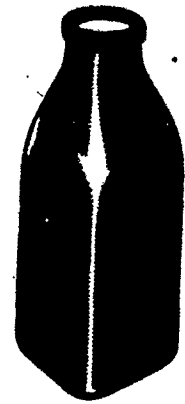
IFCA Lists First Saturday Mass
