# KC Sponsors Canadian-Style Football

Aquinas Stadium will be the scene of the first Canadian-style football game ever played here on Sunday, Aug. 19, when the Rochester Pros meet the London (Ont.) Lords in a Knights of Columbus sponsored charity exhibition contest.

The game will mark the third venture by the local chapter of the K. of C. in promoting pro exhibition football here. National Football League games having been staged here in 1953 and 1954.

But the Knights will claim two firsts on this promotion in that it will be the first daylight promotion by them and, of course, the first game to be played entirely under Canadian rules. Proceeds of the game will be contributed to local charity groups.

THE PROS, new entrants in the Ontario Rugby Football Union, are stocked with former college and high school stars. Leading lights on the squad are Charley Maloy, ex-Aquinas star who went on to win All-America fame at Holy Cross College, Art Nowack, former Aquinas and Notre Dame star, Don Bardell, of East High and University of Rochester where he won Little All-America honors and Roy King of Madison High and Heidelberg College.

Vince Mazza, the Pros coach who played his football with the Detroit Lions of the NFL and later in the Canadian circuit, feels he has the beginnings of a good football club, one which will give a good account of itself as the season unfolds. It is no secret that Vince plans to count heavily on a sharp passing attack.

In Maloy, who set Eastern collegiate passing records when he played with the Crusaders, Mazza has the necessary equipment for the passing game. Look for Charley to crank up his pitching arm often this season.

WITH FEW exceptions, the Canadian game doesn't differ greatly from the American game. Many observers feel that the difference favors the Canadian game, giving it more action.

The Pros are working out five nights a week at Redman's Field in Lexington Ave. Nowack and Maloy both are assisting Mazza with the coaching.

London is coached by Indian Jack Jacobs, former National Football League star.

## Canadian-Style Differs Slightly From U. S. Game

Since many football fans will be watching the Canadian-style game for the first time on August 19 at Aquinas Stadium, where the Rochester Pros and London (Ontario) Lords will meet in a Knights of Columbus sponsored charity exhibition game, some explanation of rules is necessary.

1—Downs. Canada has three U. S. four.

2—Interference. Canadian teams can block only ten yards in advance of the line and scrimmage, and only two backs are permitted to block. There is no blocking allowed on punt returns, only on kickoffs.

3—Number of players. There are twelve players instead of eleven on Canadian teams; the extra player being used as a flying wing. He usually is used as a flanker, but also carries the ball, has important blocking assignments, and frequently is a pass receiver.

4—Man in motion. In Canadian football, all backfield men can be in motion in any direction before the ball is snapped.

5—Time outs. There are no timeouts permitted in Canadian football other than those signalled by the referee for injuries to move sticks or make measurement.
