Horse and Buggy Days

Pastor Reviews 55 Years Of Parish

Hitching posts and horse and buggy days in Blessed Sacrament Parish, Rochester are recalled by the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Thomas F. Connors, pastor and parish founder in The Parish Weekly of August 5 under the heading "Parish Notes - 55 Years Ago."

The notes follow:
Just 55 years ago, Bishop McQuaid appointed us to establish a parish in the eastern section of the city—in the vicinity of Monroe and Park Avenue.

Forgetting the obstacles and difficulties on the part of a number of nearby residential owners—delaying the carrying out of our plans—a combination Church, School and hall building was soon erected on what is now the first parking lot.

As time progressed, the non-Catholic neighbors gradually changed in their attitude of opposition, and Our Lord blessed this newly formed parish from the very beginning.

The parish homes in 1902 were few—the number of parishioners limited, and the Sunday offerings for the first year hardly exceeded 20 dollars.

Hitching posts on Monroe Avenue and Rutgers Street were provided for the horses and buggies of parishioners who lived in Brighton.

The first nine or ten years, we did not have an assistant—except on Saturdays and Sundays and holidays. There were few automobiles, and the bicycle was our constant friend, in attending the sick, etc.

But, like the tiny mustard seed, the parish grew by leaps and bounds, and in 1911, we began the planning of the present Oxford Street edifice.

Three Masses served the purpose and needs of the early parishioners, who attended the first edifice; but other Masses were necessarily added, when services began to be held in the present Oxford Street Church.

In order to keep the entire Church property as one unit—facing Monroe Avenue, Rutgers and Oxford Streets, it was necessary to gradually purchase no less than 11 or 12 residences.

Most of them, of course, had to be demolished, to enable the construction of the other parish buildings. The residences, north of the Church and Convent, were purchased as a protection to the rest of the property.

Much more, of course, could be stated, but it is best, like a long sermon, not to tire those who may read these few notes.

Fr. McCormack Writes From Red China Jail

Still an American prisoner in Red China, the Rev. Joseph P. McCormack, M.M., has written a letter to relatives in this country, including his brother, Edward of 416 East Main St., Palmyra, dated May 28, 1958 and received this week.

Father McCormack said by the time the letter was received he will have less than two years to serve. "It was for five years," he wrote, "from June 1, 1953 to June 15, 1958. I was informed about the definite sentence only last October, so I could not have told you much of this anyway. Then I wanted three years to have passed before I told you.

"There is good hope that the Government will show me some more leniency and shorten my sentence somewhat. In the meantime, we will remember one another in our prayers and be reconciled to God's Holy Will. Keep up your courage and take care of your health for I look forward to the pleasure of seeing you all once again.

"As you worry about me, I worry about you constantly. I feel that worry about me impaired the health of Willie and Charlie. It seems that such mutual worry cannot be avoided in our family. Few families have kept so close to one another in thought and affection as we have.

"It may seem foolish to some that we have always worried so much about one another, but for all that I am glad that we have been such a family and my heart is full of gratitude to everyone of you for your devoted interest in all that concerns me. I thank you and all Maryknights and all my friends especially for the prayers you all offer to God for me."

About the snapshot with this story he said that it was taken on a trip. "Due to the circumstances under which we live, we dressed as you see us, but believe me we are all long for the day when we will again dress as we used to."

Father McCormack is one of the Americans held in Red China for whom the Rev. Harold Rigney, Divine Word Missionary attached a "Freedom Crusade." The Crusade aims to remind Chairman Mao Tse-tung of his promise of September 1955 to release all American prisoners in China.

Petitions, thousands of which have already been sent from all over the country, should be addressed: Chairman Mao Tse-tung, Peking, China and there is no necessity for a return address.

Among the speakers are Dr. James J. Cribbin, Fordham University, who will give the keynote address; Father Francis J. Connell, C.S.S.R., of the Catholic University of America, and Father John F. Harvey, O.S.F.S., De Sales Hall, Hyattsville, Md.
