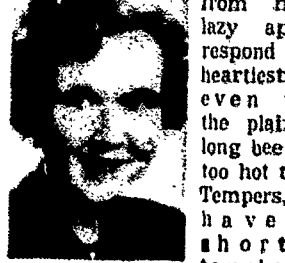

Have chicken cut up in the store, Wash, dry and dredge - four or five pieces at a time - in a paper bag containing flour (several handfuls), salt, pepper, a bare pinch of sugar (helps brown and adds a sweet taste) and paprika (pinkness adds to the alluring brown color).

Ford Grants Boosts Pay In Faculty

Chicago - (NC) - Mundelein College will match the \$120,000 Ford Foundation grant to increase salaries of all lay teachers...

Cure Of Ars

On Thursday of this week we observed the feast of St. John Vianney, Patron of the Cure of Ars. Since it was in that capacity that he spent more than four decades of his life in the Cure of Ars, it is fitting that we should look at his life and his work in the Cure of Ars.

St. John Vianney, born in France in 1786, worked as a farmhand until his nineteenth year when he began to study for the priesthood. His poor scholastic ability as well as his late start militated against him so greatly that the professors in charge of his studies declared that they did not believe he would ever attain the scholastic requirements for the priesthood.

In the face of this discouragement the young man turned to prayer and prayed particularly to a young martyr whose body had been found in the catacombs a few years earlier - St. Philomena. The prayers of the future Cure of Ars were heard and in 1818, at the age of 29 he was ordained a priest.

THE CURE OF ARS did much to spread the devotion to St. Philomena and on many occasions in explanation of miraculous cures, he would attribute the miraculous happening to her and thereby draw attention away from himself by declaring, "St. Philomena did that."

In the Collect of the Mass celebrated on the feast of St. John Vianney, we pray: "O almighty and merciful God, Who by pastoral zeal, the yoke of prayer, and the ardor of penance has made glorious St. John Mary, grant, we beseech Thee, that by his example and intercession we may be enabled to gain for Christ the souls of our brethren and with them attain to everlasting glory. Through the name Jesus Christ, Thy Son Who liveth and reigneth with Thee in the unity of the Holy Ghost, God, world without end. Amen."

A study of the foregoing prayer offers almost endless points for meditation. To paraphrase the words of a poet "What girls between us and the Cure of Ars, yet we find consolation and encouragement in the thought that the gulf may be spanned if we incorporate into our lives the love of God and his saints, the prayer, penance and faithfulness to our state in life which characterized the life of the Cure of Ars.
