Dedication Day Rites Listed At Mt. Saviour Monastery

Final plans for dedication day at Mount Saviour Monastery were formulated at a meeting Sunday, August 5, attended by Elmira and Corning area friends of the monastery. This special day of thanksgiving will be observed on August 19, the Sunday nearest the Feast of the Assumption. On this feastday in 1953, the chapel was blessed and dedicated to Our Lady, Queen of Peace, and the first Mass celebrated there.

In conformity to the family spirit which is so characteristic of Benedictine monasticism, the day's activities have been planned to meet the needs of the entire family. After the Solemn High Mass of Thanksgiving at 9 a.m., breakfast will be served in the refectory of St. Joseph House. Light refreshments will also be obtainable throughout the day.

BOY SCOUTS from St. Casimir Church, under the direction of Scoutmaster Joseph Gaytas, will operate a "fish pond" for the children, and serve as guides for those unacquainted with the monastery grounds. Ladies of the St. Scholastica League will offer needlework and bake items for the benefit of the monastery.

The newest addition to Mount Saviour, St. Joseph House, will be open for inspection all day. This building, constructed almost entirely by the monks, contains 15 cells, refectory, kitchen and library, as well as utility and store rooms. At 3 p.m. the formal blessing and benediction of St. Joseph House will take place.

VESPERS, a candle-light procession to the crypt of Our Lady, Queen of Peace, and Benediction of the Most Blessed Sacrament will be at 4 p.m. and the day's activities will conclude at 5 p.m., when the prizes are awarded.

New Outdoor Shrine To St. Joachim To Be Dedicated In Canisteo Rites

Parishioners of St. Joachim's Church, Canisteo, will honor their patron saint at outdoor rites on his feast day, Thursday, August 16, at 5:30 p.m.

A newly constructed shrine with a statue of St. Joachim will be blessed by the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Lawrence W. Gannon, dean of the Steuben diocese.

THE NEW STATUE of St. Joachim is believed to be the only one of its kind in the entire diocese.

Men of the parish have aided the pastor in erecting the shrine located between the church and rectory on Canisteo's West Main Street.

St. Joachim's was founded in 1880 as a mission of St. Ann's, Hornell. Along with St. Mary's, Rexville, the three parishes honored the Blessed Virgin and her parents, Joachim and Ann.

Little is actually known about St. Joachim except the fact that he was the father of the Blessed Virgin Mary.

Father Haffey said, "This new shrine in the quiet valley of Steuben County's Canisteo River, will foster a devotion to the saint whom Mary honored as her own father and will serve as a constant encouragement for more devout family life in the homes of Canisteo's parishioners."
