Doors That Open To Faith

Throughout the Scriptures and the writings of the saints, Catholics find the word "door" used in psalm and parable to explain articles of Faith.

A well-known painting demonstrating Our Lord's words "Knock and it shall be opened to you," shows Christ tapping at a door representing the heart of the unbeliever.

In the Litany of Loreto we call Our Blessed Mother the "Janna Coeli," the gate or door of heaven.

THE DOOR HAS become a natural symbol to the Catholic and particular doors lead him to the fullness of Faith.

Through the church door, he is carried as an infant to be baptized and freed from original sin. In death, he is taken through the church door for the last time to a final resting place.

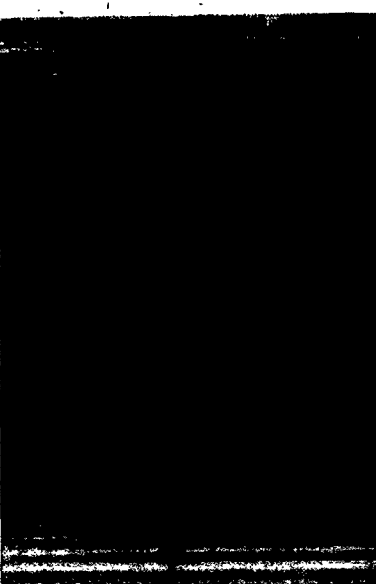
Behind the door of the confessional he receives the Sacrament of Penance, is relieved of punishment due his sins and given spiritual counsel.

The door of the Catholic school opens the way to a training in the truths of the Faith and a preparation for the world.

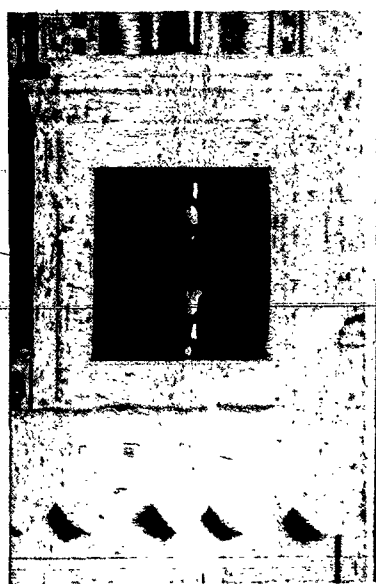
Monastery and convent doors offer a life of sacrifice dedicated wholly to Christ, the answer to His call "Come, follow Me."

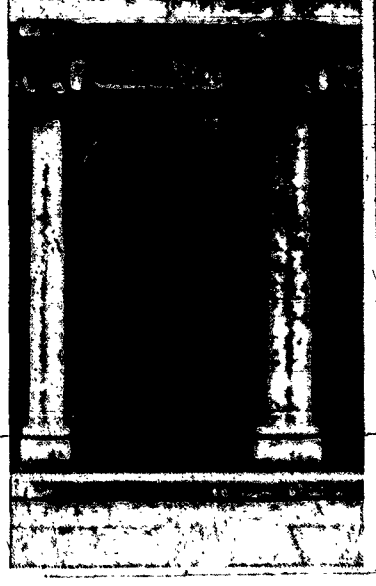

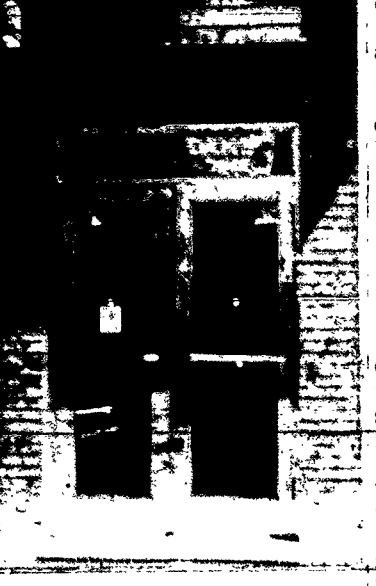

Pope Blesses Flag For Chicago Shrine

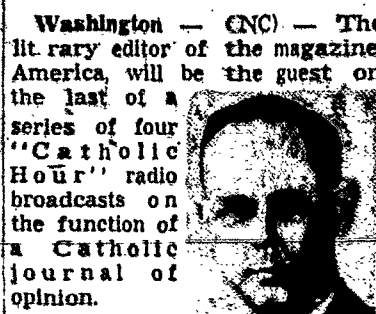

America's Literary Editor On 'Catholic Hour' Series



Washington — (CNC) — The literary editor of the magazine, America, will be the guest on the last of a series of four "Catholic Hour" radio broadcasts on the function of a Catholic journal of opinion.

Father Harold C. Gardner, S.J., will be interviewed by Dr. Francis X. Connolly, professor of English at Fordham University, on the program heard over the NBC radio network, Aug. 26, from 2:30 to 3 p.m., WHAM in the Rochester area.

The literary editor of the weekly review edited by the Jesuit Fathers will answer questions as why such a magazine carries reviews on nonreligious writings, according to an announcement of the National Council of Catholic Men, producer of the program.

TV Catholic Hour Moves To Hollywood

Washington — (CNC) — The Catholic Hour on TV will move to Hollywood for the last in its series of four programs on leading Catholic personalities. Paul Horgan novelist and historian, will be featured on the presentation usually broadcast from New York City, the National Council of Catholic Men, producers, announced here.
