

Eastman School Professor Attends Church Music Meet

Omaha, Neb.—(NC)—Dr. Eugene Sellhorst, head of the graduate school of musical arts at Rochester's Eastman School of Music, was one of more than 180 choir directors and organists representing 32 archdioceses and dioceses who gathered this week for 2 weeks of intensive study in the choir director's workshop at Boys Town.

The session is the fourth annual liturgical music workshop held at the well-known home for boys. It was begun under the patronage of Archbishop Gerald T. Bergan of Omaha.

FLOR PEETERS, noted Belgian organist and composer, is here to conduct classes and give a recital at the Dowd Memorial Chapel.

Prominent clerics on the faculty include Father Elmer Pfeil, director of Sacred Music at St. Francis Seminary, Milwaukee, and Father Francis Bruner, C.S.S.R., widely known for his writings on Church music and his translation of Jungmann's monumental "Mass of the Roman Rite."

Father Francis P. Schmitt, Boys Town Director, said that considerable emphasis will be placed on the finest contemporary Church music in the study. Dr. Peeters said in an interview that he composes religious music that shows the modern influence because "when you come to Church, you are still a modern man."

HE SAID MUSIC must reflect "the speed of modern life today" and that such music is "dissonant, more intensified and heavier in expression because music is an image of life, and life itself

is dissonant and intensified today."

"You cannot write the same music people were writing at the time of Bach when they were taking life much easier. They knew nothing of traveling from Brussels to Nebraska in 34 hours," he said.

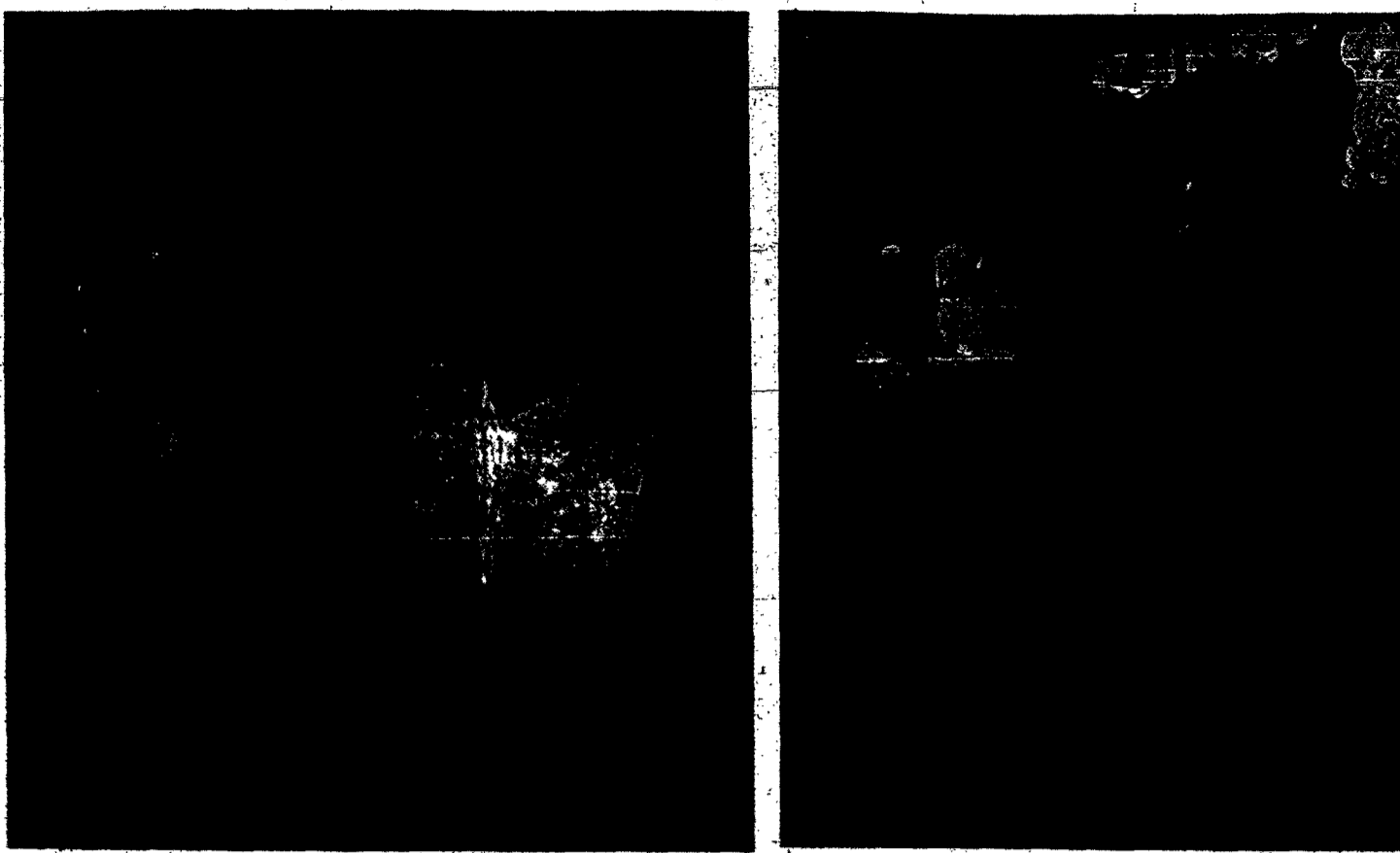
Director Named At Trinity College

School Rooms Readied For Opening

A Dodger fan from Brooklyn teaches one of the two first grades at Rochester's Holy Family School. Sister Mary Aquina, a School Sister of Notre Dame who besides planning to teach "readin', ritin' and 'rithmetic'" to 53 small fry this year, expects to "turn them all into Brooklyn rooters in time for the world series."

Most readers remember dimly their very first day of school with all its excitement and often a few tears. Not many have had the experience of his Sister who, after a summer of study, must brace herself for the onslaught of over fifty vitamin-packed youngsters, fresh from a summer of play.

Feeling a little like Walt Alston at an opener in Ebbets' Field, with hopes and fears, the Brooklyn-born Sister steels herself for the first day. Seeing so many other children all in one room, having left "mother" at the door, being indoors when its such a sunny day, are all good reasons for a six-year-old to burst into tears or even have a small tantrum.

"That's when attention must be diverted," Sister Aquina says, "with picture books or crayons, until the little one decides that school can be fun too."

After the hard lesson of routine is learned, the serious business of being a first-grader begins to progress. Besides the three "r's" and Religion, the youngsters study language arts, spelling and English.

"Preparation is half the battle," Sister Aquina says. The schoolroom, first of all, must be decorated in a colorful way to attract and interest the first-grader. Sister must also prepare a detailed syllabus of each day's work and keep a progress chart on all of the youngsters.

Parents are also encouraged to take their part in the first-grader's education. At Holy Family School, parents of first-graders receive a booklet explaining how they can best help at home in the progress of the pupil. Suggestions are made for taking the youngsters on Sunday drives to various spots, such as the airport or park, where new and different things will be seen and the children learn to associate names with them. The alphabet is graphically shown in the exact style in which the children are taught, so that the parents are correct the pupil's writing technique.

The first-graders are provided with "breaks" throughout the school day, so that they won't become restless or bored. In mid-morning, chocolate chili and cookies revive drooping heads and classroom games help keep spirits high.

Sister Aquina, who received her training at the motherhouse of the School Sisters of Notre Dame in Baltimore, Md. continues her studies during the summer and on weekends at Nazareth College. This summer her Teacher Training Course concentrated on methods of primary reading.

Besides the 53 first-graders expected by Sister Aquina, another first-grade class of 53 will be taught at Holy Family by Sister Mary Alverus. A record 800 pupils are registered at the school this year, according to the principal, Sister Mary Beatrice.
