

## Bishop To Offer Mass At Opening Of Men's College

His Excellency Bishop Kearney will pontificate at the Mass of the Holy Ghost for faculty and students of St. John Fisher College on Wednesday, Sept. 26 at 9 a.m. in the Rosina O'Doherty Kearney auditorium.

Priests of the college staff will act as other officers of the Mass.

St. John Fisher College for men, under the direction of the Basilian Fathers, will open for the 1956-57 academic year on Monday, Sept. 17.

All new students will report on Sept. 17 for orientation which includes registration. Sophomore students will register on Tuesday, Sept. 18; junior and senior students on Wednesday, Sept. 19. Lectures begin for all students on Friday, Sept. 21.

The College offers courses leading to the degrees of Bachelor of Arts, Bachelor of Science, Bachelor of Business Administration as well as Pre-Medical, Pre-Dental, Pre-Law and Pre-Engineering Professional courses.

It is also possible for students interested in education to take their teacher training and cadet teaching in the education program.

## 37 Enter Nursing Training At St. Joseph's Hospital

Thirty seven young women, including 14 Elmira, and four from Rochester will enter St. Joseph Hospital School of Nursing, Tuesday, Sept. 4. The course comprises of a three year period, the first six months designated as the pre-clinical period. During this time, principally devoted to theory, the students will have their course in religion, the basic sciences and nursing arts.

Toward the latter part of this period, they will be assigned to the patient units for a limited time daily.

At the successful completion of the pre-clinical period, the students will receive their caps and can be formally accepted into the school.

The clinical period includes theory and practice in medical and surgical nursing, O. R. nursing, obstetrical nursing, nursing of children and diet laboratory experience at St. Joseph's, and an affiliation in psychiatric nursing at Utica State Hospital, Utica.

ON COMPLETION of the course, a diploma will be awarded by St. Joseph Hospital School of Nursing; and the graduates will then be eligible to take the New York State examination, leading to licensure as a registered professional nurse.

An orientation program has been planned for the new students during their first week at St. Joseph's. This will include introduction to the classes, tours through the hospital and nurses' residence, and "Get-Acquainted" parties given by their "big sisters" of the junior class.

## 2,375 Enroll In Parish Schools, 460 At ND High

A total of 2,375 pupils with an increase of 24 are registered for the six parish grammar schools in Elmira opening on Sept. 5 and a total of 460 pupils showing a 35 percent increase is enrolled for Notre Dame High School, Elmira, in its second year of operation.

These figures were gathered in a survey made this week. Results in the grammar schools follow:

While the report shows St. Peter and Paul registration down because of discontinuance of the kindergarten, the registration is in reality slightly increased.

Notre Dame High School's registration shows the following classes: freshmen, 170; sophomores, 129; juniors, 155 and seniors, 65.

The high school will have a teaching personnel of 14 Sisters of Mercy, two full time lay teachers and two part time lay teachers.

Our Lady of Lourdes School building program is reported progressing but the school will not open until September, 1957.

## 2 Catholic, 1 Public School Under 1 Roof

Two Catholic parochial schools and a public school will open under one roof in East Rochester on Wednesday, Sept. 5.

The unique situation is brought about by the fact that the East Rochester Public School requires additional space, this year and St. Joseph Parish, Penfield is opening a parish school pending the building of its own school. Coupled with this is the fact that the newly constructed St. Jerome School, East Rochester has only reached five grades this year.

St. Joseph School with the Sisters of Mercy in charge, with Sister Mary Duzman, R.S.M., principal and Sister Mary Richard, R.S.M. The school will begin with a first grade of about 37 pupils and second with 27 children. This school will be conducted in the CYA building attached to the new St. Jerome School.

Four rooms of St. Jerome's will be used for the public school pupils of the second grade. Conducted by the Sisters of St. Joseph, St. Jerome School will open with five grades in charge of Sister William Margrave, S.S.J., principal.

Opening of the unique school was announced by the Rev. Roy B. Morphy, pastor of St. Jerome's, East Rochester; and the Rev. John D. Malley, pastor of St. Joseph's, Penfield.

## Bishop Kearney Blesses Camp's New Cabin

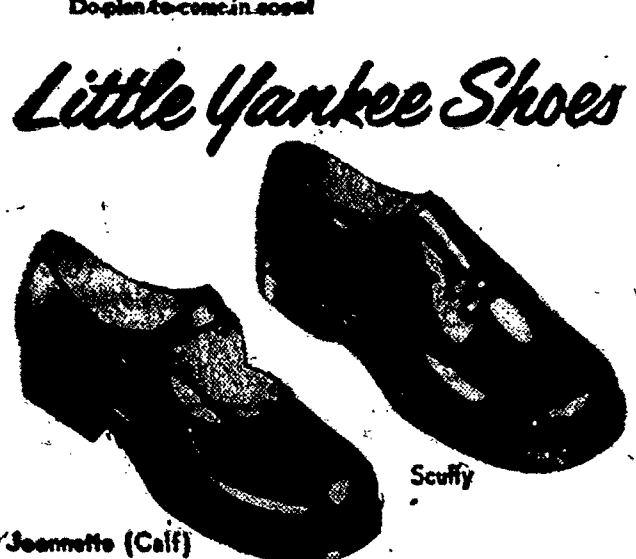
As a climax to the camping season, His Excellency Bishop Kearney celebrated Mass for the campers and counselors in the camp chapel and blessed the new cabin, Our Lady of Mercy, at Camp Stella Maris, Friday, Aug. 24.

Dedicated in honor of the Sisters of Mercy who have served in the kitchen and infirmary of camp for many years, the new cabin is the tenth unit of housing on the spacious camp grounds. Each cabin houses 12 boys or girls and two counselors and has been designed to furnish adequate protection in any weather.

THE 1956 CAMPING season at Camp Stella Maris was the largest in its 30 year history. A total of 519 boys were accommodated during four encampments and 255 girls spent two encampments at Conesus Lake. The boys' staff was headed by Michael Volpe as head counselor assisted by Michael Daly, Joanne P. Biegler returned for her second summer as director of the girls' camp.

Rev. Eugene H. McFarland, diocesan youth director, is executive director and resident chaplain during the entire season. The camp office announced today that the special registration cards issued to this summer's campers will be accepted between Sept. 1 and Dec. 31. Regular registration will open Feb. 1, 1957.

Also, a special edition of the paper will be available at the pamphlet stand. This edition is dedicated to St. Joseph, the patron of Labor Day.
