Centennial Jubilee Celebration Slated At Victor Parish

The 100th anniversary of the founding of St. Patrick Church in Victor, of which the Rev. E. Joseph Esser has been pastor for 21 years, will be celebrated on Sunday, Sept. 30.

Solemn High Mass at 10:30 a.m. will be celebrated by His Excellency Bishop Kearney. Numerous visiting priests and nuns will be in attendance. Edward T. Malone, general chairman, has appointed 12 assistant committeemen to arrange the details.

A DINNER will be held following the Mass at 12:30 p.m. in the Victor Central School. Kenneth McChane will be in charge of the dinner arrangements and Joseph Lortscher is arranging for dinner ticket distribution.

An historical review of St. Patrick's work in the last 100 years in Victor has been prepared by a committee composed of John Colligan, Lawrence Keeffe, Miss Jane Colligan and Miss Esther McCarthy. This historical record will be available at the centennial Mass and will contain many items of interest regarding the origin of the parish and the names of the priests who have served throughout the years. This book will contain names of some of the original families, descendants of whom are present-day parishioners. Illustrations will show many items of interest since the first services were held 100 years ago in the room over the Pimm Barber Shop.

Ex-Rochesterian To Organize New Parish

The Rev. William A. Kraft has been appointed by Bishop Charles F. Buddy of San Diego, Calif., to organize a new parish of St. Theresa of the Child Jesus in newly developed residential area in San Diego.

Father Kraft is a graduate of Nazareth Hall, and Aquinas Institute where he was editor of the school paper, the Maroon and White, and St. Andrew Seminary where he was editor of the annual, The Star.

APOSTLESHIP OF PRAYER

The General Intention recommended to the prayers of all Associates of the Apostleship of Prayer for the month of September is "Conjugal Fidelity."

THE FULL INTENTION for this month asks us to give some thought to the worth of conjugal fidelity. The love of a man for a woman is akin to the love of Christ for his Church, and the love of a woman for a man is like to the love of the Church for her Divine Spouse. How can the world fail to see that Christ would use the words of the New Testament to describe the love of a man for a woman? "You do not dare say them out loud for fear you will offend the vast majority of your neighbors. If you move in certain circles of society, you will not care to be considered naive, the butt of jokes, a laugh for those who have left conjugal fidelity far behind—along with taboos and the superstitions of the dead past.

You cannot know what marriage means unless you get up to it on the supernatural level. Short of that, you have a system of breeding among animals which works well in its purpose of preserving the species. A human effort to duplicate the system would have to find a substitute for instinct, and the lawlessness of conscience. No check, by way of law, for the nation in all history claims to have solved the problem. Only God can solve it.

TO DO THIS He has related wedlock to the dignity of a Sacrament. In this kind of an atmosphere marriage can reach the goals set for it in the mind of God, and in so doing bring happiness into life on earth. This is reality; anything less is only a dream.

What does wedlock mean to Christ? Because the work of redemption was a work of love, the elements of love had to be in it. There had to be a complete giving of two to each other of all that they were and all that they had; the two had to be made one.
