The only time in the Gospel Our Lord is recorded to have sung a song was the night He went out to His Death. He spoke most on the subject of joy, the same night as the darkness of Gethsemane and the shadows of the Cross were already falling across His Path. Referring to His sacrifice on the Cross and the necessity of being united to Him, He added, "These things have I spoken." John 15/11.

He wants us to have His Joy. But what was His Joy? Loving self-sacrificing service for others. His Joy will be in us, He said on the same condition, namely, a deep sense of otherness. As selfishness is the root of all unhappiness, so sacrifice for other is the source of all joy. Not just a spasmodic sacrifice but a sacrificial spirit.

Each day make an act of self-denial. Mortify your eyes or your ears; deny yourself a half hour of radio or television. For example, just to train yourself not to give way to every impulse. As you do so, say: "Dear Jesus I do this to purchase the light of faith for parana in Africa, and the learning of the word of God in Burma or India. Give up a soft drink, or the purchase of a paper, or walk a few blocks instead of taking a bus. Put the money in a special pocket — (we have a mission pocket in our clothes). As you do so say: "This hurts my dower nature, but I do it in the union with you O Christ because you gave up your life on the cross for my salvation and the souls of the world."

Refurbished, Newly Equipped School Houses St. Ann's, Hornell Pupils

Hornell — St. Ann's School, Hornell, opened its fall semester with an entirely new look throughout its modernized interior.

The extensive program of redecoration and remodeling, which began directly after school closed in June, was completed at an approximate cost of \$45,000.

Substantial improvements were made to the exterior as well as the interior of the building. A new entrance, ornamented with glass bricks, and 56 new draught-proof windows enhance the outward appearance of the building as well as serving their more practical purpose.

EVERY CLASSROOM has been remodeled and completely equipped with all new furniture. The old scabbled floor has been replaced with marble paneling resembling the blond wood of the sturdy desks and chairs. The walls of the classrooms are painted in cheerful, non-glare colors. The upper walls are of soft coral and the wall trim is in a green-tinted gray. Ceilings are of a creamy ivory. In effective contrast, the corridors are painted a moss-green.

New hardwood flooring has been installed, so that now a double sub-floor exists throughout the school. Remodeling in the classrooms and corridors revealed the unusually sturdy construction of the school. It is built with eight by 12-inch timbers, and with studs measuring three by 10 inches, rather than the usual two by four inches.

UNNECESSARY doorways in the classrooms were eliminated to provide for additional room space and to simplify corridor traffic. With the new arrangement, not more than two classrooms open onto any corridor. This was planned to eliminate congestion and to provide for efficiency and increased safety at fire drills.

Additional lights, with non-glare fixtures have been installed throughout the building. The Catholicity of the school is evident the moment the visitor enters the school. A large Crucifixion shrine is directly opposite the door. Its bronze base depicts each of the seven sacraments. Small bronze statues of Sts. Matthew, Mark, Luke and John complete the group.

A plaque near the large Crucifixion which centers the shrine is inscribed in memory of the benefactors of St. Ann's School from 1889-1956. Nearby, a perpetual vigil light burns.
