150 Freshmen Expected At Nazareth College

A total of 150 Nazareth College freshmen will report for the orientation program on Monday morning, Sept. 17, at 9 a. m. Resident students are due on campus Sunday afternoon. Out-of-town freshmen and their parents will meet the dean, Sister Rose Angela, and other members of the faculty and will be escorted to their residence halls, where they will be welcomed by the Sister in charge of the halls. The attractive modern dormitory on the fourth floor of Meddell Hall, just completed, will house 20 freshmen and the remaining freshmen will live in St. Joseph Hall and Santa Maria Hall on East Ave. The orientation program will open with an assembly of all freshmen in the auditorium, where they will be greeted by Sister Rose Angela and welcomed to Nazareth. A comprehensive testing program will be administered on Monday and Tuesday for the purpose of educational guidance and placement. ON BOTH DAYS their big sisters, members of the junior class will have lunch with the freshmen in the dining hall. Monday afternoon, Mary Ann Handlan, Geneva, undergraduate association president, and Judy Keagney, Fitchburg, Mass., vice-president, will greet the freshmen and faculty counselors will also be on hand to get acquainted with the new students. Representatives of campus organizations, Miss Seana Monaghan, president of Fremont Mission Unit, Miss Margaret Croty, president of the Sodality, Marcia Vanderhook, president of the Women's Recreation Association, Joan Korn, N.F.C.C.S. representative and Glee Club representatives, will introduce the freshmen to the campus program. Included in the program are visits to the Motherhouse Chapel and prayer garden, departmental meetings, and informal group meetings with the Juniors. The formal program will close Tuesday afternoon with an entertainment in the Auditorium, presented by the junior class. Miss Marjorie Merkel is the president of the class and Miss Mary Ann Woodward is chairman of the committee which planned the orientation program for the freshmen. Attractive booklets have been mailed by the Juniors to their little sisters with hints and tips for successful and happy campus life.

AMONG WOMEN 'Rules For Schooling'

This week our children brought home from our parochial school a little pamphlet that I wish every parent of every school child would have an opportunity to read and study. It is printed from an article in "The Liguorian," published by the Redemptorist Fathers in Liguori, Mo. The book is entitled "Rules for Schooling." Most books dealing with rules for school or study are directed to the student. This is clearly intended for the parent, and for the benefit of those who will not receive this booklet I am quoting from it today: "If you are a parent, and have a child attending school, you have a number of responsibilities that are extremely important for the welfare and character-formation of your child. The school is not an independent institution, that takes your child into its shelter and leaves you nothing to think about or worry about while it is there. Nor is it a place into which you can follow your child each day and dictate every word that is spoken and every idea that is set forth. "THE SCHOOL is a supplement to your home, and over all the new relationships into which it brings your child you have the duty of exercising a prudent and watchful supervision. "At almost any point in the school setup, it is possible for parents to make mistakes and do harm—Some parents do little or no thinking about the whole matter, sending their children off to school with a sigh of relief and a spirit of abandonment, and perhaps they wake up to what is happening to them only when suddenly some urgent problem concerning one of them is thrown into their lap by the school. "Others create problems in respect to their children's schooling by undue interference and meddling, which can do almost as much harm as gross negligence and unconcern. "FOR THESE reasons there is need of a set of rules that parents can study and adopt for their own conduct in regard to their children's schooling. As they are here set down, each rule reflects mistakes that have been made by parents because they either knew nothing about the rule, or acted contrary to the wisdom it contains. "Before reading or studying these rules, it would be good for parents to review some of the fundamental facts about their responsibility in the education of their children. There are three such facts to be kept in mind, on the basis of which the rules to follow are laid down. "First, the primary right and duty of education rests on parents. They may and must teach their children whatever things they think their children most need to learn and they themselves are capable of teaching. They may and must choose a school for their children whose subject matter and methods of teaching conform to their beliefs as to what constitutes a good and complete education. SECOND, WHEN they send a child to school, parents are delegating some of their teaching authority to the school. This delegation is neither absolute, in the sense that the school takes over completely the task of the parents; nor is it merely nominal, in the sense that the parents have a right to interfere at will and whim with the child's teachers at school. "Third, parents must, while their child is in school, back up the authority of the school, watch for any clear abuses of that authority, and supplement the teaching efforts of the delegated teachers of their children. "On the basis of these fundamental facts about parents' duties in regard to the education of their children, the following practical rules may be set down for their guidance. These rules apply to all children in grade school and with but slight modification to those in high school." These rules we shall discuss in a future column.
