

Bishop Casey Addresses McQuaid Student Body

In language adapted to his youthful audience, His Excellency Auxiliary Bishop Casey, addressed 200 Rochester area youth last Tuesday morning at McQuaid Jesuit High School.

The Bishop told the boys that neither cynicism nor Sunday Catholicism has been typical of the Catholics of this area and it would be up to them, the young men of today but the tone-setters of tomorrow, to see to it that neither type of Catholic be typical of the future.

Stressing the importance of study in the life of a fully developed Catholic, the Bishop told the high school students: "You have to transfer the burning desire for perfection you have in sports to the field of studies, and then you will have success. Studies is the key which opens the door to success."

A WARNING was also given that of those to whom many talents have been given, much shall be required by the God Who has given those talents.

The impressive talk of the Rochester Auxiliary Bishop was given after a solemn low Mass in honor of the Holy Ghost, patron of all who study and seek for Truth. "This Mass," said the Bishop, "I have offered for the scholastic and spiritual success of the students and faculty here at McQuaid."

Pontifical Rites Conducted For Father Eugene Regan

Funeral services for the Rev. Eugene B. Regan, a native of the Town of Bloomfield and widely known in the Diocese of Rochester as a mission preacher was held in St. Theresa Church, Niagara Falls, of which he was pastor, Wednesday, Sept. 12.

Father Regan, 68, died in Sacred Heart Home, Clarence, Sept. 8, 1956 following a year's illness.

Solemn Pontifical Requiem was celebrated in St. Theresa Church by His Excellency, Auxiliary Bishop Leo R. Smith, V.G., of Buffalo. A large number of priests of Buffalo diocese and some from Rochester attended.

AS A MEMBER of the mission band of the Buffalo diocese headed by the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Thomas J. O'Hern, brother of Rochester's third Bishop, the late Most Rev. John F. O'Hern, Father Regan was heard in St. Mary's, and other missions throughout Western New York.

Father Regan was a chaplain with an Army combat unit in World War I, serving several months in France. On his return he served with the Mission Band.

Born in Bloomfield Nov. 20, 1888, son of the late John and Anna Regan. Father Regan moved with his parents as a boy to Syracuse, where he attended parochial school and was graduated from the Christian Brothers Academy.

After graduation from Niagara University he completed his studies at Niagara University Seminary and was ordained for the Buffalo Diocese in 1912.

HIS FIRST assignment was as assistant at St. Nicholas Church, Buffalo. He organized and was pastor of St. Thomas Aquinas Church, Buffalo, resigning in 1941 because of poor health. He served as chaplain at Mt. St. Mary Academy, going in 1946 to St. Jerome's Hospital at Batavia as chaplain. He became pastor of St. Theresa's in Niagara Falls in 1953.

Father Regan is survived by two sisters, Mrs. Charles V. Bryan and Mrs. Thomas E. McGrath, and a brother, Dr. Francis C. Regan, all of Rochester.



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
