\$200,000 Fund Drive Listed At St. Andrew's

A Minimum Need Campaign for \$200,000 will be conducted next month in St. Andrew Parish, Rochester, the Rt. Rev. Msgr. George W. Eckl, pastor, announced today.

The campaign for a minimum of \$200,000 will be conducted on a pledge basis with payments covering a three year period. The funds are to be used for paying off the existing debt on the new school, the long delayed expansion of the rectory and a station wagon for the Sisters.

THIRTY CAMPAIGN division leaders reported an enrollment of 145 captains at a meeting of the campaign committee, Thursday evening.

Monsignor Eckl congratulated the committee and thanked the assembled captains for having volunteered their services. He reminded the group that this was the first campaign for a parish project in his 42 years as pastor and said he felt confident it would greatly exceed the \$200,000 minimum need.

The Rev. Raymond G. Heisel, assistant pastor, who is handling the campaign, exhorted the men to continue the splendid work until all 500 men needed to solicit the parish have been enrolled.

Father Heisel noted the importance of attending every meeting and suggested that all other activities take second place for the campaign duration. "Manpower is the answer, he said, and with an enrollment of 500 men no one volunteer will have more than four calls to make on Sunday, Oct. 14, opening day of the effort.

Mr. Waldert, 77, founder of Waldert Opticians and a former member of the board of the Shuron Optical Co., died Sept. 10, 1956 in St. Mary's Hospital.

Mr. Waldert was associated with Shuron for 32 years as a traveling sales representative and served on the board for 12 years. He retired from the firm in 1923 to devote full time to his own company, Waldert Opticians, which he had founded in 1915.

At a Shuron salesman, Mr. Waldert covered the territory between Albany and Washington. He was a former director of the Guild Prescription Opticians of America and also held membership in the Rochester Club.

Mr. Waldert was taken ill about nine months ago and on Sept. 6 was admitted to the hospital for surgery.
