Religion Teacher Training Courses Offered To Diocesan Men, Women

Two Diocesan Teacher Training Courses in Religion will open in the Diocese of Rochester, one in Fairport and the other in Ithaca on Monday, Sept. 24. The Rev. Albert H. Schnacky, diocesan director of the Confraternity of Christian Doctrine announced today.

Father Schnacky has extended an invitation to "militant Catholic men and women" to enroll in the courses to be taught by Sisters Mission Helpers of the Sacred Heart CCD teachers; he explained, spreads the faith by instructing children who do not have the blessing of a Catholic school education.

REGISTRATION ON the night of opening may be made at Assumption Church Hall, 20 East Ave., Fairport or at Immaculate Conception School, 315 W. Plain St., Ithaca. The 30 hours of method to be taught will be covered in sessions from 7:30 to 9:30 p.m.

Thirty hours of doctrine will be presented by a priest. Upon completion of the course, a Certificate for Teachers of Religion will be presented by His Excellency Bishop Kearney. The certificate by catechists will then be "the right hand of the pastors in their respective parishes," Father Schnacky said.

The confraternity director said that he has received numerous calls from clergy throughout the diocese asking for certified teachers to staff their release time and after school classes. He said there are not enough lay teachers to meet these needs and to satisfy requests. "Who knows," he said, "how many souls will enter eternal life because zealous laymen and laywomen have prepared themselves for this important work?"

The need is cited in the situation in the Diocese of Rochester which shows: 50 percent of our younger Catholic children in public high schools; 75 percent of our older Catholic children in public high schools.

FATHER SCHNACKY said that tomorrow's sequel will mean: 50 percent of our Catholic parents will never have attended Catholic schools; 75 percent of our Catholic parents will never have attended Catholic high school.

How well instructed will they be? Father Schnacky quotes Pope Plus XII on the problem as follows: "Priests will not suffice. The laity must lend their valiant cooperation and deem it their sacred duty."
