Hockey Makes Debut In Rochester Sports

Rochester Americans hockey team will play their first game of the 1956-57 season in Rochester, Sunday, Oct. 14 at the Community War Memorial against the Cleveland Barons. This will mark the first time in 20 years that Rochester will be represented in the American Hockey League.
The team should prove to be an interesting one due to the fact that players are being sent from Toronto and Montreal, the two best clubs in the National Hockey League.
The club has been in training at Montreal since Sept. 28. The coach of the Americans is Billy Reay, who brings a wealth of hockey experience gained as both a player and coach. His record dates back to 1939 as a professional, and his coaching experience began two years later, in 1941. He comes to Rochester after three years in the Western Hockey League — two as playing coach of the Victoria Cougars, and last year as full-time mentor of the Seattle team. Billy is married and has two children, Adele and Billy Jr.
The Rochester Club will be well rounded out with both rookies for speed and veterans for good-defense. Youngsters like Paul Hasnick, 5' 9", 165 pound centerman, will be a main spark-plug in the line, along with Glen Cressman, a 21 year old right wing, who is known to be an excellent checker when his team is short-handed. 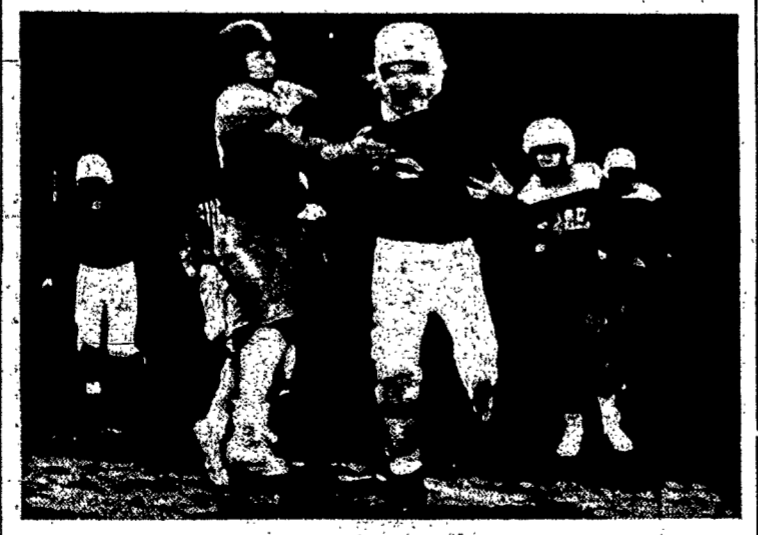
