

Community Chest Agencies Give County-Wide Service

Two hundred persons are reported as having participated in the Chemung County Community Chest through the Catholic Family Center in four towns in an article by J. Henry Brown in the *Elmira Star-Gazette*.

The Community Chest campaign for \$357,925 to support services of the agencies wherever they are needed was opened in Chemung County on Oct. 5 and will continue through Oct. 22.

Analyzing the sources of funds and how the money is distributed, Brown's article stated:

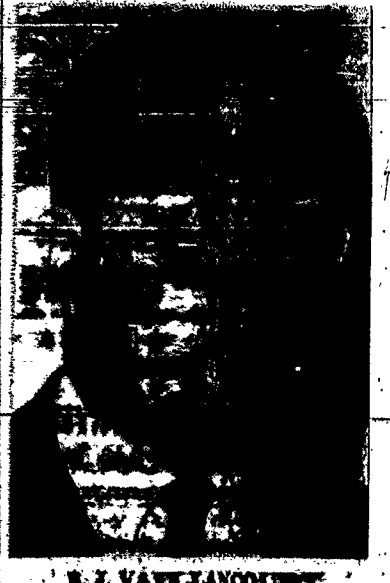

FOR GEOGRAPHICAL reasons this Council is now known as the Chemung-Schuyler Deanery.

Christianity Alone Can Save West Says Carlton J. H. Hayes

Montour Falls — Students of St. John's Seminary were addressed by Carlton J. H. Hayes, professor of history at Columbia University and former ambassador from the U. S. to Spain on the topic of "Christianity and Western Civilization," Saturday evening.

Dr. Hayes pointed out that "the most precious characteristics of our western civilization — respect for the individual person, the independence of religious and civil authority, and compassionate charity — all derive directly from Christianity."
