

U. S. Liturgists Ask English In Church Rites

Assisi, Italy — (NC) — The North American Liturgical Conference recommends that the Mass of the Catechumens (that part of the Mass up to the Offertory) be permitted to be said in the language of the people.

The conference also recommends that priests in the active ministry be granted permission to recite the breviary in their mother tongue.

The recommendations were among 20 made by the board of directors of the North American Liturgical Conference at the liturgical week in London, Ontario, August 20-23, 1956. They were made public for the first time here at the International Congress of Pastoral Liturgy.

In a preface to the resolutions, the board of directors said: "It is because we know that the pastoral purpose of the reforms makes the Holy See eager to hear from the liturgical apostolates in the various countries that we record these resolutions which express the desires of this group for the continuation of the liturgical reform. We believe that they fit in with the pattern already established and that they would have special value for the Church in our region."

Blacksmith Reports 'Bleeding Crucifix'

Nice, France — (NC) — A blacksmith in the nearby village of Tourrettes claims that while he was attaching the corpus on a crucifix he was making drops of blood began flowing from the hands of the figure of Christ.

The Smith Yves LeCaer immediately called in two women who were working nearby and both have confirmed that they too saw blood flowing from the corpus.

A full report on the incident has been sent by the parish priest to his Ordinary the Bishop of Nice. He also sent the crucifix here for an analysis of the blood on it.

K. of C. Supreme Director Burke Lauds Geneva Past Grand Knight At Testimonial

Geneva — "We need 4000 Mike McDonalds every year if we are to meet the challenge of our times," said William E. Burke, supreme director of the Knights of Columbus at the testimonial dinner given for Past Grand Knight Michael McDonald and the other officers whose term of office had expired.

Two hundred members gathered Wednesday, Oct. 3 to pay their respects to an outstanding leader who for two years has given his time and effort to the building of the council and to aiding in the development of Columbianism in the upstate area.

Under the chairmanship of Chas. E. Hamill, who acted as toastmaster, following the introduction of a large number of out-of-town guests, the present Grand Knight John A. Murray presented gifts from the council to Trustee Thomas Gallagher, Warden Anthony Pieroni, Counselor Edward Mulcahy, Treasurer Dr. James Walker, and Editor of the monthly bulletin, Gerry Pool.

TO McDONALD he presented a Past Grand Knights ring. In his acceptance speech, McDonald thanked his fellow officers and the members for the splendid cooperation they had given him during the past two years.

He especially praised Past District Deputy John J. Mahoney for the advice and counsel he had given him. He said that "the growth of the council and the order is not represented by mere statistics. Among the members of the hierarchy and clergy and in the eyes of the public, our order has attained a position of influence and regard that has never before been equaled. Geneva Council is the greatest in the state for a city of its size."

Joseph Wallace, state chairman of civic affairs and vice-chairman of the Upstate Conference said he came to Geneva to pay his respects to Mike McDonald.

It. Rev. Msgr. Edward K. Bell, V.P., and Rev. Raymond P. Nolan both paid high tributes to McDonald as an outstanding leader, a devoted father, a credit to the police force.

BURKE STRESSED the fact that the high ideals of the Knights of Columbus are a challenge to live up to and that a man cannot be a good member of the order unless he is a good Catholic.

Chaplain Rev. William Hickey, District Deputies William O'Connell of Newark, Bruce Bartran of Waterloo, John J. Mahoney, and Sir Knight Raymond L. Nary, master of the 5th District of Calvert Province of the Fourth Degree also paid tribute. The Rev. John Duffy, Rev. Robert Smith, and Rev. Daniel Toomey were among the clergy present.

Director Burke declared "that if we are to meet the challenge of our time we must heed the persistent appeal of our Bishops for a strong lay apostolate to curb the evils of secularism and the ignoring of Almighty God himself." He pointed out the loose morale of our times, the evils of certain books and magazines, of some TV shows. He blamed parents of today for much of the juvenile delinquency in the fact that they live only for today.

BURKE SCORED Athleteism, Communism and said that we cannot accept any liberalization, or can we accept any portion of the theme of peaceful co-existence. He said that we cannot be just a social or a fraternal body, "we must build up our forces to bring Christ to men and men to Christ."

In closing, Mr. Burke said that "today we need no steel or armor, but just the God-given weapon of the spirit; we need reason to anticipate, to discover, and to think with the Church; we need strength, not of assets but of spirit; we need discipline; we need prayer; we need love of God and neighbor. So we as Knights of Columbus and as Americans require much, and for night we salute Mike McDonald as a Knight of Faith, of hope and of love."

Past District Deputy Matthew Kelleher, on behalf of the Past Grand Knights Association, presented McDonald with a pin representing his new station in the order. Thirteen past grand knights were present at the dinner and their combined years of service in the order totaled 454 years.

On the occasion of his birthday, Fire Chief Lou McGulgan was presented with a birthday cake with one candle. George E. Boisvert and Charles Hauber were co-chairmen; of arrangements, and Richard J. Walsh and Michael Simeone, co-chairmen on attendance. John M. Toole was caterer and chairman of the dinner committee.
