

New Church, School To Be Built In Gates, Fund Campaign Planned

Funds for construction of new church and school buildings for St. Theodore's Parish, Spencerport Road, Gates, will be sought in a parishwide campaign Sunday, Nov. 11, the Rev. Raymond J. Epping, pastor, announced today.

Construction of foundations for the new buildings will begin within a few days on the 38-acre parish plot. Completion is scheduled by next September.

Increasing parish population has resulted in overcrowded conditions in the present frame combination church-school building. Father Epping pointed out the church, seating 268, is overcrowded at some of the five Sunday Masses, and the seven-classroom school is taxed to capacity with more than 300 pupils. Five Sisters of St. Joseph and two lay teachers staff the school.

New building plans include a church seating 700 and an eight-classroom school adjoining the rear of the church building.

Organization of a large committee is underway for the two-hour parishwide solicitation on Sunday afternoon, Nov. 11. Assisting in direction of the campaign is Foley Associates, Inc., a Rochester fund-raising organization.

St. Bonaventure Granted \$7,500

St. Bonaventure, N. Y., — St. Bonaventure University received a check for \$7,500 from the Eastman Kodak Company, Rochester, according to the Very Rev. Brian Lhotka, OFM, St. Bonaventure, president.

The unrestricted grant to the University was made possible through the Eastman Company's program of aid to privately supported colleges and universities. This program stems from the Company's belief that the cost of education to colleges is generally greater than income from tuition and fees. Officials feel they share a responsibility with the alumni and other interested supporters to help schools meet these deficits.

THE AMOUNT of the check received by St. Bonaventure was based on the number of Bonaventure graduates employed by Eastman during 1951 and who are currently employed by the company. Grants amount to \$500 for each year of normal academic work successfully completed by each graduate to meet the requirements of a regular degree program.

Four such graduates of St. Bonaventure employed by Eastman meet these requirements. They are Bernard F. Clinto of Rochester, Raymond E. Nannini of Penfield, George E. Perrin and John J. Villa, both of Rochester.

In addition, to share in these grants, the schools must be accredited by the appropriate regional accrediting association. St. Bonaventure is accredited by the Middle States Association and the American Medical Association.

Dr. Walsh, 86, Dies In Corning

Corning — Dr. Jeremiah H. Walsh, 86, native of the Town of Campbell, who became a famous physician and surgeon, died in Corning Hospital Friday evening, Oct. 12, 1956, after an extended illness. He had resided at 138 Pine St. for some time.

Dr. Walsh retired in 1913. His wife, the former Miss Mary A. Nash of Chicago, died at Corning January 12, 1947. Mrs. Walsh was a sister of the late Patrick Nash, of Chicago, a leader in Democratic circles of the Midwest.

Dr. Walsh was the son of the late Robert and Julia Lyons Walsh of the Curtis area. He was graduated from the University of Buffalo and practiced in Chicago for many years. He was chief of surgeons at several Chicago hospitals and taught anatomy at Rush Medical Center. He specialized in brain surgery.

For several years he was secretary of the American Medical Association and he was also a member of the Chicago Board of Education. He was a member of St. Mary's Church here.

He is survived by a brother, John D. Walsh of Campbell; two sisters, Margaret Walsh and Mrs. Elizabeth McCallin of Curtis; a daughter, Mrs. Josephine Jones, a teacher in Salvo, Canal Zone, and several nieces and nephews.

The newspaper attributes the boycott to "recent unusually aggressive clerical propaganda."

Diocese Acquires Brighton Land For New Parish

The Diocese of Rochester took title Tuesday to the 14-acre site at 2815 East Ave., Brighton upon which St. Thomas More Parish plans to build a church and school.

The deed recorded in Monroe County Clerk's office showed the diocese paid \$30,000 for the property to the estate of William A. E. Drescher, vice president of Eausch & Lomb Optical Co., who died in 1936. While his litigation over zoning was in progress, the diocese had a contract to purchase, subject to getting zoning permission.

THE DEED showed that Mr. Drescher's widow, Mrs. Annie E. Drescher, reserved life use of the homestead. David H. Shearer, attorney for the diocese, said the diocese now can go ahead with its program to build the church and school for St. Thomas More parish and that contracts are expected to be let about Jan. 1.

Mrs. Drescher did not retain use of two smaller houses and the garage nor the land needed for the church and school. FRANK J. Goodwin appeared as attorney for the Drescher estate in closing the deal.

The Court of Appeals in Albany on July 11 by a 6-to-1 vote reversed lower courts that had upheld refusal of the Brighton town board of appeals to grant the required permit in a Class A residential district.

Shearer said a second suit brought by the diocese and the Drescher estate attacking the constitutionality of the zoning ordinance was discontinued by agreement, in view of the highest state court's decision in the first suit.
