James E. Marcille, 248 Alameda St., was elected grand commander of the Alhambra, at an election meeting at Valley Echo on Tuesday, Oct. 23.

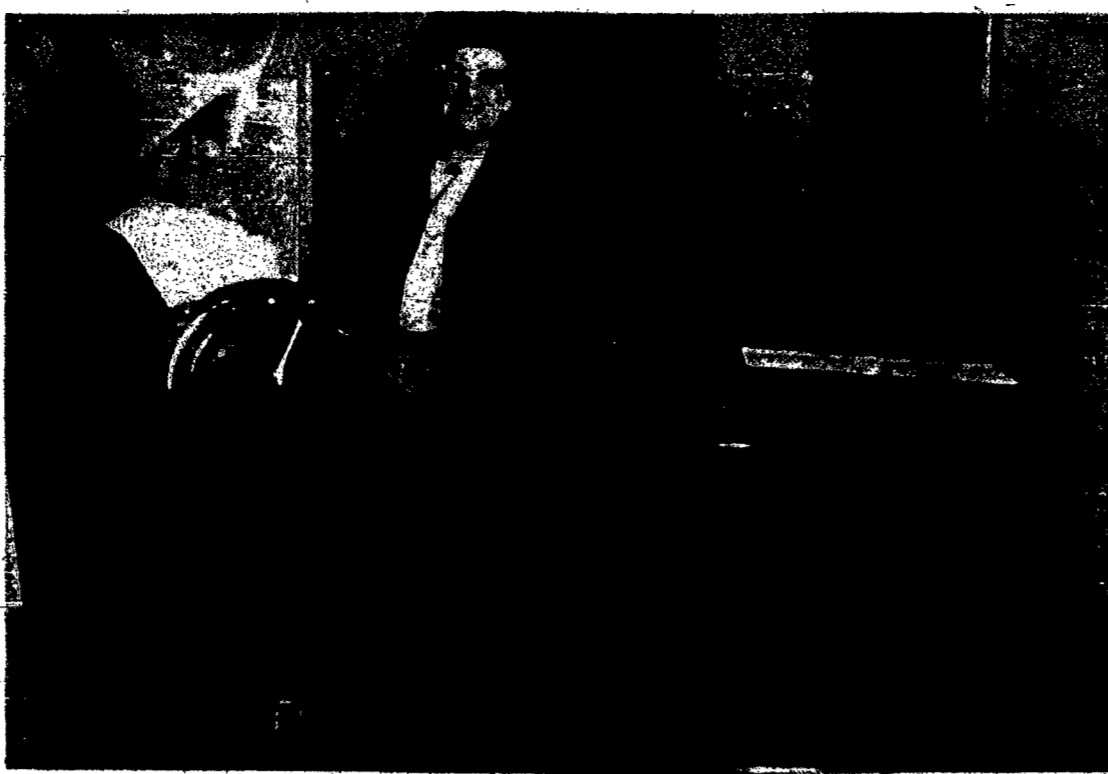

Annual Clinic Day Held At St. Mary Hospital, New Equipment Demonstrated

Highlight of the program of scientific presentations at the third annual Clinic Day of St. Mary Hospital, yesterday, Oct. 25 was a demonstration of the newly acquired equipment of the Cardio-Pulmonary Laboratory set up at the hospital.

The laboratory, a reality through the generosity of Rochester philanthropist, is for diagnosis of diseases of the heart and blood vessels.

The Clinic Day was a post-graduate teaching day held for the attending staff of St. Mary's and physicians who took training at St. Mary's but are now practicing in other areas.

A DINNER at the Sheraton Hotel at which Doctor Hugh H. Hussey, professor of medicine at Georgetown University Medical School spoke, followed the scientific program. Wives of the physicians attended.

The Cardio-Pulmonary Laboratory demonstrated will enable St. Mary's staff to carry out diagnostic tests which ordinarily are available only in the large medical centers. In this way, it was

stated at the demonstration, it should be possible to effect cures for many conditions which previously have gone undiagnosed in the early and most curable stages.

This unusual testing station was developed as an outgrowth of the educational program at St. Mary's of which Dr. John Butler is director. Many of the tests utilized in this laboratory were developed in research centers where the applicability of basic science to the ill person is explored and diagnostic tools evolved.

When the methods have been perfected in the research laboratory they are then made available on a limited scale to the hospital patient, it was explained.

St. Mary's has embarked on a program to develop facilities which will provide its patients with those tests which have been found most useful in research centers. Through a carefully planned long-range program, the hospital has arranged for the training of various staff members in the performance of these

intricate tests, the doctors were told.

DONORS OF the present Cardio-Pulmonary Laboratory were revealed as follows: the fluoroscope was purchased with funds donated to the Montgomery E. Leary Fund in memory of the late Dr. Montgomery Leary. The rest of the equipment for the laboratory and a Peripheral Vascular Laboratory were purchased with a gift of \$7,000 from the Gannett Foundation.

Because of the great expense involved in equipping such projects, philanthropy is depended upon for financial support. Benefits of such projects are realized by the community in the form of better medical care, it was explained.

The dinner program included a welcome by Dr. Joseph Lane; address by Dr. Hussey with Dr. John H. Remington, master of ceremonies and Dr. Edward J. Schnorr, chairman.

In the morning session held in the hospital auditorium, Dr. Butler made opening remarks and in the new laboratory panel discussion, Doctors Carl Impelitter, John McCabe and Charles Matthews, took part.
