

Talk On Prejudice Set At House Of Hospitality

The "Roots of Prejudice" will be examined in the second in a series of discussion meetings at 8:15 p.m. Monday, Nov. 5, at St. Joseph House of Hospitality, 402 South Ave. The public is invited.

Speaker will be Miss Edna M. O'Hara, Ph.D., assistant professor of sociology at St. John Fisher College. Sponsoring the talk, which will be followed by a discussion period, is the newly formed Fides Forum, comprising members of the group which conducts the hospitality house.

MISS O'HARA was graduated from St. Xavier College for Women, Chicago, and obtained her sociology degree from Catholic University of America, Washington, D. C. From 1951 to 1954 she was a resident staff member

at Fides Neighborhood House, an interracial agency under the auspices of the Archdiocese of Washington, D. C.

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Ground Broken For New St. James Parish Convent

Ground was broken last Sunday for the new St. James Convent to be built at 123 Whittington Rd., Irondequoit. The Rev. Francis M. Feeney, pastor, officiated, assisted by the Rev. Richard E. Murphy, assistant pastor, and the Rev. David Murphy, of the St. Andrew Seminary faculty.

Present for the ceremonies were Mother Mary Magdalene, superior general of the Sisters of Mercy, Sister Mary Rene, superior of St. James Convent, and Sisters of the staff.

Members of the executive committee of the recent convent fund appeal—present were Leon T. Ward, chairman, Bernard J. Fichette, Edmund H. Principe, Walter F. Morton and William M. Mulcahy.

THE TWO-STORY fireproof convent, to be built of concrete block with brick veneer, will face on Whittington Rd. and have accommodations for 20 Sisters. The property extends 100 feet on Whittington Rd. and 150 feet on Brett Rd.

A covered corridor will lead from the L shaped building into St. James School. The community room will lead onto a large porch and garden with an outdoor shrine donated by the pupils of St. James School.

Refectory, kitchen and cook's suite will be situated on the Brett Rd. side of the convent and a sound proof music room will be placed off the corridor from the school.

Architect for the new convent is Edward A. Lorschelder and John Luther and Sons is the general contractor. Plumbing and heating will be installed by A. J. Heintz, Inc., and electrical work is by Fantaci-Cachette, Inc.
