

Lourdes Campaign Set Sunday

Parish solicitation in the campaign for a new convent in Our Lady of Lourdes Parish will be conducted Sunday, Nov. 11 from 2 to 5 p.m. according to campaign chairman, Harold Coleman. Paul A. McGuire is vice chairman.

Impetus to the drive was given in an address by His Excellency, Auxiliary Bishop Casey when all special gifts committee and general parish solicitation workers attended a dinner at Sheraton Hotel ball room, last night.

A small army of parish workers under the leadership of Carroll Casey, chairman and James Farrell, vice chairman will meet in the church, Sunday at 1:30 p.m.

Minimum goal set is \$200,000. Four divisions of men directed by leaders Joseph Heyer, Philip Lucier, John Norton and William Rockwood will open their campaign at 2 p.m.

The special gifts committee effort was launched by His Excellency Bishop Kearney speaking at the Rochester Club in October.

The Rev. Francis W. Luddy, pastor and honorary drive chairman announced that the present convent is being razed on the site and construction for the new convent was to begin the next week. Sisters of St. Joseph teach in the school.

The fund appeal is set up on a 24 month budget plan wherein each wage earner in the parish will be asked to contribute one day's wages per month over the 24 month period.

St. Lucy Drive Exceeds Goal For Renovations

The two hour canvass of the parishioners of St. Lucy Parish to provide funds for the renovation of the church and school, held last Sunday, has exceeded its goal of \$40,000 according to the Rev. Genaro J. Ventura, administrator.

In announcing the successful completion of the campaign, Father Ventura said the amount pledged was slightly more than \$44,000, with more returns coming in daily. The final results will be announced at a victory rally to be held in the church hall Saturday, Nov. 10.

FATHER VENTURA praised the loyalty of the workers and parishioners who made the success of the appeal possible. He expressed appreciation of the fact that more than 90% of the people contacted contributed to the appeal.

The committees were assisted by Foley Associates, Inc., a local fund raising counsel.

Kickoff Dinner For St. Theodore Parish Drive To Hear Bp. Casey

His Excellency Auxiliary Bishop Casey will address more than 200 men of St. Theodore Parish, Gates, at 6 p. m. Saturday, Nov. 10, in the Powers Hotel at a kickoff dinner on the eve of their parishwide fund drive for new church and school buildings.

Three-year pledges will be sought in a two-hour solicitation from 1:30 to 3:30 p. m. Sunday. Construction of the new building already has begun on the Spencerport Road property. They will replace the present frame church and school structures which growing population has rendered inadequate.

The present church building will be remodeled for use as a parish hall, according to the Rev. Raymond J. Epping, pastor.

Nearly 200 parishioners gathered on the property last Sunday for ceremonies of dedication of the new 200-car parking area and the blessing of automobiles. Two-lane in and out drive ways have also been installed.

St. Theodore Parish was created in 1924, with the late Rev. John J. Baier as first pastor. The present school building originally was erected as a combination church-school. In 1951 the parish purchased another frame structure and attached it to the rear of the first building, converting it into the present church seating 268 persons. The original building was remodeled for school use exclusively.

The parish school was opened in 1924 with two Sisters of St. Joseph teaching 64 pupils in eight grades. Today the seven classrooms are at capacity on enrollment with 315 pupils. Staff

ing the school are five Sisters and two lay teachers.

Father Epping announced that the new buildings, of light buff brick, are expected to be completed by next September. They are being constructed just west of the present buildings on the 38-acre parish plot.

Priest Area Directors Named In Clothes Drive

Appointment of seven priests as area directors of the Catholic Bishops' Thanksgiving Clothing Collection, to be held in the parishes of the Rochester Diocese during the week of Nov. 18, was announced by the Rev. E. Leo Mannus, diocesan director of the drive.

The newly appointed directors are the Rev. Daniel Hogan, Monroe County; the Rev. Benedict Ehmman, Chemung and Schuyler Counties; the Rev. Leo A. Jones, Cayuga County; the Rev. Otto Vogt, Tompkins and Tioga Counties; the Rev. Robert Smith, Ontario, Seneca, and Yates Counties; the Rev. James O'Connell, Wayne County; and the Rev. James P. Slattery, Corning.

Last year, parishes of the diocese contributed 250,000 pounds of usable clothing to swell the nationwide total of 11,200,000 pounds. Shipments of clothing were made to Austria, Belgium, Colombia, Ecuador, Egypt, Formosa, France, Germany, Greece, Hong Kong, Italy, Japan, Korea, Lebanon, East and West Pakistan, the Philippines, Portugal, Trieste, and Viet Nam.

Father Scheid Marks 20th Year As Pastor

Parishioners of Our Lady of Victory Church are busily engaged in planning their annual fall festival, which, this year will be held on Saturday and Sunday, Nov. 17 and 18, a reception in the K of C building from 4 to 6 p.m. for Father Scheid.

Born in Rochester on May 17, 1892, Father Scheid was educated in St. Michael School, St. Andrew and St. Bernard seminaries. He was ordained to the priesthood June 8, 1918 and celebrated his first Mass in St. Michael Church. HE SERVED as assistant pastor of Holy Family Church in Rochester until 1924, when he was transferred to assistant pastor of SS. Peter and Paul Parish, Rochester where he remained for four years. In 1931 he was appointed pastor of St. Januarius Church, Naples, and St. Matthias Church, Atlanta. He remained there until he was named pastor at St. Mary's in 1938.
