Applications For Merchant Marine Academy Entrance Now Available

Washington—Representative Harold C. Ostertag today announced that he will entertain applications from qualified young men in the 39th Congressional District for education and training at the Merchant Marine Academy at Kings Point, N. Y.

High school students in their senior year, between the ages of 17 and 22, are eligible to apply, as are graduates who are within the required age bracket.

Applicants must have fifteen high school units of credit, including three in English, three in mathematics, and one in physics or chemistry.

The Merchant Marine Academy, similar to the other academies of the armed services, trains young men to serve as deck or engineering officers commercial vessels of the United States. Its students receive the degree of Bachelor of Science upon graduation, and may apply for a commission as Ensign in the Naval Reserve.

A total of 25 students will be appointed this year from New York State. Selection is based on academic standing and aptitude tests, plus convincing evidence that the applicant has a genuine interest in making a career of the Merchant Marine service.
