Each Tuesday during their senior year the sociology seniors also take observation trips to local and out-of-town institutions, where the directors of the institutions explain their aims and functions.

This field work program is in line with the policy advocated at Nazareth College to provide all students with some practical experience in their chosen vocational field. Business and science students are encouraged and assisted in obtaining summer vacation positions in their line of work. Nursing students in their junior year affiliations as well as in observation trips in their senior year are introduced to various fields of nursing.

This field work program is the final step in the vocational guidance and preparation program at Nazareth College for its students. In all departments of the college this vocational preparation is interwoven with a carefully planned program of liberal studies, which includes for all students, courses in theology, philosophy, English, history, foreign language, and science.

### Memorial Mass Set By Alumnae

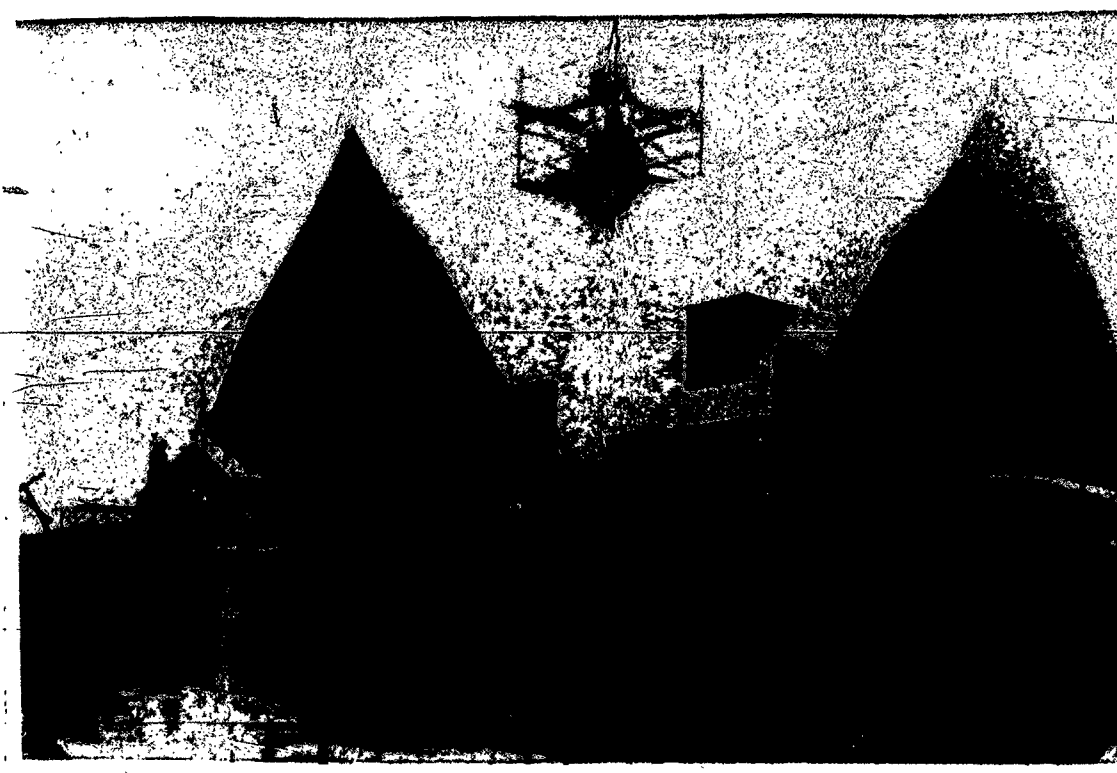

### College Library Roof Installation Beats Snowfall

Workmen on Nazareth College Library building have won the race against winter weather and snow. Finishing touches on the roof over the new building were completed last week, panes have been put in the leaded windows, the final intricate work on the tower has been done by skilled mechanics, and the entire building crew is ready now to proceed with the interior of the imposing structure which will house the college library.

St. Joseph the Worker seems to have held this project under his special protection, according to the Sisters. Andy Tufano, the building superintendent stated that only seven days have been lost on account of the weather—a remarkable record in construction statistics in Rochester.

Faculty, students and friends—clergy and laymen have shown a live interest in the progress of the work, since ground was broken on April 12. The Sisters report practically every evening several visitors drive through the grounds to see what has been done since their last visit.

Students and faculty make a walk around the building a daily habit, to view the magnificent entrance, or the frame which will hold the lovely stained glass window at the south end of the reading room, or the two floors of stacks, or the carrels at the west windows.

Most encouraging to the Sisters of St. Joseph has been the tangible evidence of interest on the part of the public as shown by the unsolicited gifts, ranging from a few dollars to a block of securities worth well over a thousand dollars. Many items in the new building could serve as splendid memorials to deceased students, faculty, or alumnae or other friends of the college. The four great churches in Rome, Italy, are St. Peter's, St. John's, St. Mary's and St. Paul's. For years Rome, N. Y., had only three — St. Peter's, St. Mary's and St. John's. But Rome, N. Y., soon will have its St. Paul's.

At the direction of Blouin, Walter A. Foery, of Syracuse, St. Peter Parish in growing Rome, was split up and a new parish of St. Paul's marked off. Msgr. Edward P. Buttner, pastor of St. Peter's said Rome Catholics have contributed \$250,000. in the first phase of a building campaign and that work will start soon on the new St. Paul Church, with a rectory, school and convent to follow as soon as possible.

## Trinitarian Nuns Plan Convent Move

A house at 207 Edinburgh St. is being remodeled to provide a convent for the Missionary Servants of the Most Blessed Trinity (Trinitarians) according to the Rt. Rev. Msgr. John S. Randall, pastor of Immaculate Conception Church.

The Trinitarian Sisters who came to Rochester in 1929 were founded by Father Thomas among spiritually neglected souls. The Motherhouse is in Holmsburg, Pa. where the Father Judge Memorial Chapel and the new Motherhouse were dedicated in 1953.

Four of the Sisters will be located in the Christ the King Missionary Cenacle transferred from Prince St. Sister Jean Anthony, M.S.B.T. who is custodian will be assisted by three other nuns. They are working in the following parishes: Immaculate Conception, Annunciation, St. Patrick's, and Holy Apostles, Rochester.

The Blessed Trinity Missionary Cenacle is located in Lyons, also in the Diocese of Rochester. The Sisters teach Religion to children attending public school, conduct religious vacation schools, and make visitations in the parish of a missionary nature.

**Enslaved Persons Remembered At Mass**

A special memorial Mass and corporate Communion for the intention of the enslaved persons in Iron Curtain countries attracted many of Hungarian descent to Holy Rosary Church, Sunday, Nov. 2.

The Mass celebrated by the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Charles F. Shay, pastor, who delivered the sermon, was sponsored by Holy Rosary Memorial Post No. 942, Catholic War Veterans and Ladies Auxiliary.

In his sermon, Monsignor Shay compared the persecution of Hungarians to that of the early Christians.

"We deplore the brutality of the Soviets dealing not only with the Hungarians but also with the other Iron Curtain countries," Monsignor Shay said. He suggested that his hearers pray that the Soviets be given "common sense" so they may do their part toward bringing peace to the world.

The 106 pupils of Holy Rosary School represented by Gene Eisenberg, Rose Petrone, Mary Ellis, Gerald Territo, John Corcoran and Thomas Healy presented a spiritual bouquet for his fellow compatriots to former Hungarian Army Captain Louis Lott of 11 Berkeley St., Rochester.

In a parade preceding the Mass, the following participated: representatives of countries behind the Iron Curtain, Catholic War Veterans, American Legionnaires, Veterans of Foreign Wars, Knights of St. John and Boy Scouts of America, Troop 101, both of Holy Rosary and Catholic Lay Award recipients from Holy Rosary Parish.
