Return Journey

WOULD YOU SAY that it is unusual for one Jew to speak lovingly of another Jew, from the pulpit of a Catholic church? And would you find it even more unusual if this first Jew turned out to be a Catholic priest?

Undoubtedly you would. And yet this is exactly what happened during the August Solemn Novena to St. Jude held at the National Shrine of St. Jude in Chicago.

Father Arthur B. Klyber, C.S.S.R., a convert from Judaism, preached the novena sermons and the first thing he

recalled in a later interview was that Jude is merely another name for Jew.

Father Klyber's baptism (February 8, 1920) occurred, under God, as a consequence of a Catholic friendship begun while he was serving with the 6th Submarine Flotilla in the First World War.

Over a period of almost two years he made repeated visits to one particular Catholic family in Los Angeles.

He speaks with great respect of the exemplary behavior of this family's members with him. They welcomed him warmly, honestly into their home without qualification, and not once did they attempt to force religion on him.

One day, while they were out driving, the mother jokingly suggested young Arthur should join the Knights of Columbus. It was her way of intimating he ought to become a Catholic.

The suggestion was not new, but once consciously raised it compellingly confronted the mind. Father Klyber said he found himself applying every fear and objection a Jew could conceive against himself.

A Jew was a Jew, and if there was one thing repugnant to him it is the thought of being joined in faith to Christ — this pretty much sums up his reaction.

Breaking briefly with his Catholic friends, Arthur fought

He tried first, without success, to enter the Jesuit school. He was too unquipped ever to catch up, they told him.

Next he approached the Redemptorists who happened then to be conducting a mission in a local church. Discouraged here, he went to the Franciscans.

Father Klyber recalls with a rather ironic amusement his meeting with the large Franciscan Father, a German, who was not entirely free of animosity towards both the triumphant allied forces and the Jews. The Franciscan told this young Jewish convert in his sailor's uniform to go home, "get a job and remain in the world."

Happily, Father Klyber said, full of gratitude to God for the grace of perseverance, he held to his ambition. Returning once more to the Redemptorists, he obeyed their advice — to test the durability of his vocation by waiting an additional three months — and at the end of this period he entered the Order. He was ordained in June 1932.

Along with his regular assignments as a Redemptorist, Father Klyber devotes himself constantly to a personal apostolate to his own people, the Jews, for their conversion.
