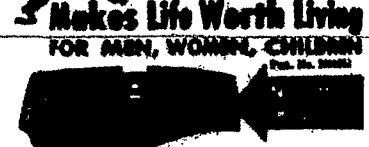
She was born July 2, 1873 at Perkinsville, the daughter of Jacob and Mary Ann Steinhart Henkel.

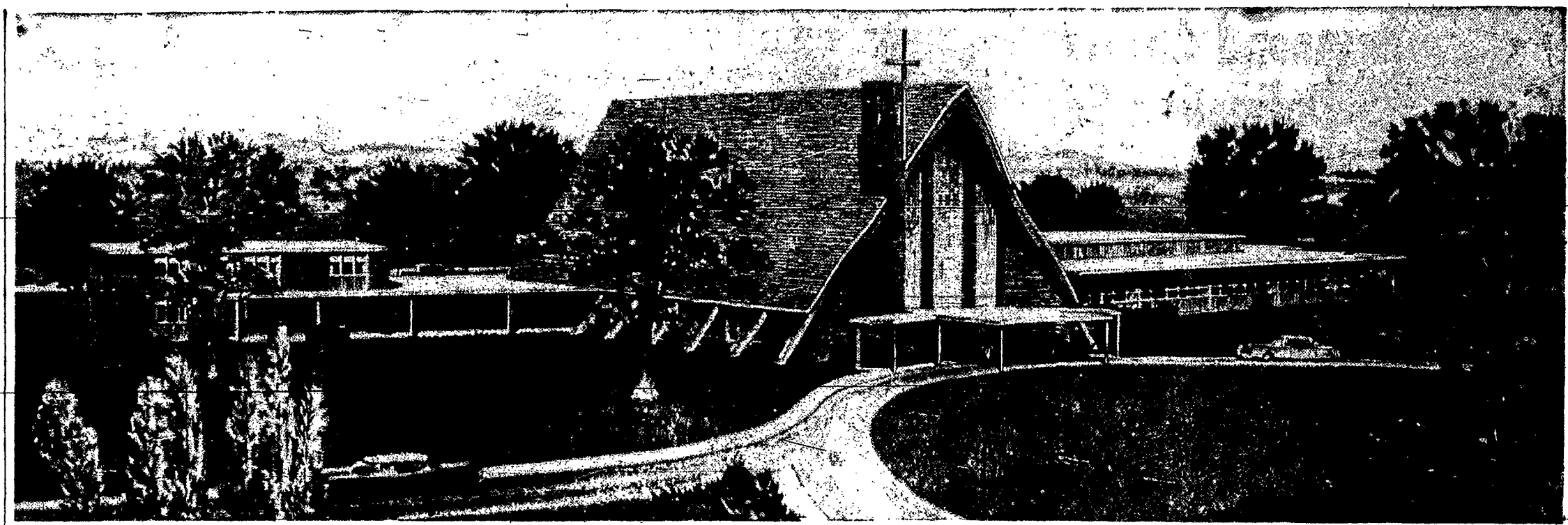

Fr. Richard Hart Honored By Hornell Parishioners

Hornell — The Rev. Richard A. Hart was honored by more than 200 parishioners of St. Ann Church, Hornell and other friends at a farewell reception in the Pine Room of St. Ann's Church.

Father Hart was transferred as assistant pastor of St. Ann's to the assistant pastorate of the Church of the Assumption in Fairport about a month ago. He had been in Hornell since his ordination to the priesthood in June, 1933.

IN PRESENTING Father Hart with a gift from the parish, the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Lawrence W. Gannon, V.F., pastor, expressed the "sadness the entire parish feels at Father Hart's leaving."

"That feeling of loss, however, is tempered by the knowledge that we in Hornell have been blessed by Father Hart's influence. We have a sense of gratitude and honor in the realization that Father Hart began what shows promise of a brilliant priestly career here in Hornell," Monsignor Gannon said.

IN RESPONSE, Father Hart said leaving Hornell was "the hardest thing I ever had to do."

He added: "In Fairport, I feel like an emissary from Hornell's Chamber of Commerce. I certainly was blessed by being assigned to St. Ann's to begin my work as a priest. Under Monsignor Gannon's guidance, everything which might have been done, was done."

He expressed appreciation to the young people for their "loyal cooperation" in Sodality participation which he encouraged with marked success. In his concluding remarks, he commended the priests with whom he was associated and the townspeople in general for their friendliness and many kindnesses to him.

The Girls' Choir of St. Ann's sang an original tribute to Father Hart set to the Fred Waring arrangement of "The Night Before Christmas." Words and direction were by the Sisters of Mercy of St. Ann's School.

The girls sang two encores, "An Army of Youth for Christ the King" and "Thanks Be to God." Josephine Antonelli accompanied the choral group.

Refreshments were served from a buffet table centered with a statue of Our Lady of Fatima. Mrs. Frank Hornbeck, president of the Steuben Deaconry, DCCW, and Miss Virginia Hussong, past president, presided at the table. Father Hart, before his transfer, was spiritual director of the Steuben Deaconry.

Corning — Mrs. Catherine B. Welch, 83, of 386 E. First St., the only woman ever to serve on the Steuben County Board of Supervisors, died at the Corning Hospital last Saturday.

Prayer service was held at the A. W. Beilby and Son Funeral Home Tuesday morning of this week, followed by Requiem Mass at St. Patrick Church. Burial took place in St. Mary Cemetery. She is survived by a son, Lyman A. Welch, at home, and a niece, Mrs. Joseph Durkin of Corning.

SHE WAS born in the Town of Corning Feb. 12, 1873, the daughter of John and Catherine Egan Cleary. Her husband, the late John M. Welch, for several years served as a member of the Common Council representing the first ward.

Mrs. Welch was a member of the Democratic County Committee for about 10 years and was also vice chairman of the Democratic City Committee when the latter group organized under a rule requiring that one female member be elected from each of the local wards.

A communicant of St. Patrick Church, she was a past president of Corning deanery, National Council of Catholic Women; past grand regent of Court St. Joseph, Catholic Daughters of America, and a member of the Stella Maris Society and the ladies auxiliary to the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen.
