Owego Church Remodeling Plans Given Approval

Owego—Drawings for the remodeling program for St. Patrick's Church by the Diocesan Building Commission. Blue prints and specifications are being now processed for approval by the Commission.

The tentative plans call for the lengthening of the church hall, beneath the church by about 30 feet, the addition of a large workable kitchen, and a movable stage for use when needed. In the church proper, a larger sacristy will be built and an ambulatory will be built to connect the priests' sacristy with that used by the altar boys. An entrance will be built in the rear of the ambulatory. It is also planned to place the main altar flush with the back wall and move the Communion rail out about one foot. This will give a space of about 16 feet from the Altar rail to the Altar itself, instead of the present eight feet.

The Communion rail, instead of extending straight across the church will be curved at each end, thus making the side altars into shrines. The front entrance of the church will be changed too.

An additional confessional will be built where the baptistry now is, and the latter will be moved to the eastern end of the vestibule. New doors will replace the present ones and the steps across the entrance will be extended across the whole width of the church.
