'Geneva Not A Ghost Town' Says Pastor

Geneva—The loss of some of its industries and the removal of Sampson Air Force Base, "by no means makes Geneva a ghost town," the Rev. Raymond P. Nolan, pastor of St. Stephen Parish, told members of the Rosary Society at a holiday gathering at the Knights of Columbus home.

He called attention to the fact that St. Stephen's Building Fund collection has reached the 64 percent mark in its first year, and that the revenue of both Catholic parishes has been kept up. This, he said, is assurance in itself, that Geneva "is not without hope."

Marquette League Asks Yule Gifts Sent For Indian Mission Children

"In a few days the parks and streets in all the big and small towns in our rich land will sparkle with Christmas trees and gay decorations," an appeal from the Marquette League begins this week.

"Big-name charity organizations and church societies will broadcast invitations to Christmas parties and turkey dinners for one and all. Every child, no matter how poor, if he lives in or near a fair-sized town, may have a bit of Christmas. Christmas for all children but those of America's Forgotten Race," the appeal said.

"With very few exceptions there are no prosperous communities on Indian reservations. There are no electric lights, public parks and 'Big Name' charity organizations have no agencies on Indian reservations."

SOME SEVEN years ago, Monsignor Bernard Cullen, director of the Marquette League, the organization devoted to promoting the welfare of the Indians and Eskimos in the United States and Alaska, decided to do something about the situation.

He begged for toys, dolls, books, games (old or new). Many generous persons responded and last Christmas the Marquette League sent out some 80 man-size crates of toys to its missions. These were distributed to the children of some 150 settlements on 28 Indian reservations scattered through the 48 states.
