Children Register For Camp

Although the 1957 camping season at Camp Stella Maria is more than six months away, the camp office reported today that a large number of former campers have registered for next summer.

The boys and girls who attended camp last summer were given a special registration card as they left camp and parents were advised that this advance registration was valid only until Dec. 31.

PARENTS of the 1956 campers who have not yet registered their children by this special registration have only two weeks to take advantage of this courtesy. Beginning Feb. 1, 1957 registration is open to the public on a "first come first served" basis and former campers must take the risk of losing place to new campers. Even though Camp Stella Maria has expanded, each year registration fill earlier for the popular Diocesan Camp on Conestoga Lake.

Boys (ages 8-15) and girls (ages 8-14) who are coming to Stella Maria for the first time may register after Feb. 1 at the camp office, Columbus Civic Center. Registrations cannot be received over the telephone but a 1957 registration card and camp bulletin will be sent to parents who write or call for it.

Chinese Girl Gives Check For Hungarians

Hungarian refugees seeking a new home in Rochester will be aided by a check presented this week by a Chinese girl representing Nazareth College's Fremis Mission Unit.

Miss Marina Pang of Hong Kong, a student at the college, presented a check for \$250 to the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Arthur E. Ratigan in behalf of the Catholic Charities Emergency Relief Fund for Hungarian Refugees. Another check was presented to the Rev. George S. Wood, diocesan director of the Propagation of the Faith to be forwarded to a Chinese missionary.

THE HUNGARIAN FUND will be used to house, clothe and feed the refugees until they are permanently placed. Besides the 35 refugees already in Rochester, there are 15 more families expected shortly under Catholic sponsorship, Msgr. Ratigan stated.

The Rev. John Lee of Hong Kong, a personal friend of Miss Pang, will receive the other donation of the Fremis Mission Unit. Miss Pang stated that Hong Kong has grown to be the densest populated city in the world due to the communist persecutions.

The people are living in poorly constructed shelters, she said, and are being plagued by fires. Father Lee is in charge of building concrete homes for the many refugees and looks after their needs and education.

\$645,398 Pledged Toward Hospital Building Fund Goal Of \$1,000,000

A total of \$645,398 for 65 percent of the goal in the St. Joseph Hospital Building Fund campaign was reached Monday evening it was reported at a meeting in Mark Twain Hotel, Elmira.

The final report meeting will be held next Tuesday, the day the drive is scheduled to end. The business and professional division, under the chairmanship of Dr. Milton Goldsmith, reported for the first time with \$21,956 in pledges.

The division received heavy support from its public employees section, led by Dr. Joseph Ferralotti, which reported \$12,384. The section covers employees of the Elmira Reformatory, city firemen, policemen, maintenance workers and teachers.

The advance gifts division led by Charles F. Kennedy turned in \$11,008 to reach \$239,740. This is 103 percent of its \$230,000 goal.

A BREAKDOWN of the pledges by other divisions showed: Corporation division, \$245,851 of a \$400,000 goal; hospital family, \$14,000 of a \$10,000 goal; clubs and organizations division, \$19,715 of a \$20,000 goal; metropolitan and allied towns division, \$13,875 of a \$50,000 goal; Horseheads division, \$7,825 of a \$15,000 goal; medical staff, \$82,334 toward a \$125,000 goal.

Children's Court Judge Daniel J. Donahoe presided at the meeting, attended by about 200 persons. The invocation was given by the Rev. Latta R. Thomas.

Hornell Holy Name Reelects Joseph Bullock

Hornell — Joseph Bullock was reelected president of St. Ann's Holy Name Society at a Communion breakfast at which Police Chief Harold P. Lewis was guest speaker.

There were 80 men at the breakfast in the Pine Room of St. Ann School. The breakfast followed Mass in the church at which the Holy Name Society members received Holy Communion.

During the business session, at which Toastmaster George Husong, past president of the society, presided, James Broderick was elected vice president; John Mazar was elected secretary; Leo Harkins was reelected treasurer and Charles O'Brien was reelected marshal.

CHIEF LEWIS, in his talk on "The Police and The Community," said that a good police department is measured by the amount of security it provides for a community.

To fulfill its first function, that of protecting life and property, the members of the police department are called to perform a variety of duties, Lewis pointed out.

Last year, 492 major cases and 7,884 minor cases were investigated. In addition to these, routine tasks occupied a great many hours. A breakdown of these assignments includes:

Hours spent guarding school crossings, 2,280; trying doors of the business establishments, 245; watching empty factories, houses and business places, 62; reporting street lights out, 132; payroll convoys, 1,024; assisting ambulance, 205; funeral escorts, 169; windows broken or open, 43.

To do these services, two police cars traveled a distance of 72,920 miles at a cost of \$3,122.85, Chief Lewis reported.

Traffic safety is a major task of the police department, he continued. Last year, the department investigated 370 accidents involving motor vehicles. More than 60 talks on safety were given by members of the department.

Of the 287 arrests made, 64 were for felonies, he added, and 154 felonies were reported. The Hornell Police Department

ment encouraged its officers to participate in the educational course, Lewis said. Members of the department attended a school on delinquency; a course on alcoholism at Yale University and participated in advanced in-training school.

"Continued education is necessary to keep the police well informed. Any community should realize the value of an efficient police force and should cooperate in every way possible to maintain this safeguard to public and private security," he concluded.

The Rev. Leo J. Mans, spiritual director, welcomed the men and expressed appreciation to the committee in charge of arrangements.

Donald Clark was general chairman. Breakfast was prepared by James Broderick, Maurice Watt and Robert Kubiak and served by the high school boys of the parish.
