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Funeral Rites Conducted For 5 In Corning Area
Five deaths were reported in the Corning area, this week. Services were conducted as follows:
Corning — Requiem Mass was celebrated last Thursday morning, Dec. 6, 1956 in St. Patrick's Church for Leo J. Reilhan of 186 Park Ave., well known local businessman and an active member of St. Patrick Church. Mr. Reilhan died at his home the previous Monday evening.

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The Rev. William Cannon, pastor, offered Mass and also officiated at the committal in St. Mary's Cemetery. Mass followed prayers at the Poland Funeral Home.
Bearers were Raymond Colegrove, Richard Tinker, Edward Eames, Harold Advance, Thomas McLaughlin and Henry Moss, all members of Local 700 of the Carpenters' Union.
Mr. Reilhan, a native of Corning, had been in the construction business with his father, the late Patrick Reilhan, until the latter's death 19 years ago. Since that time he has conducted his own construction business. He was a member of the Carpenter's Union, Local 700, St. Patrick's Parish and its Holy Name Society.
Mr. Reilhan had been an election inspector for over 25 years in the First Ward; where his father had been alderman. He gave up these duties a year ago because of his health. At one time he and Mrs. Reilhan conducted a confectionery store at 66 East Market Street.
Mr. Reilhan was born here Sept. 7, 1892, the son of Patrick and Margaret Donnelly Reilhan. He married Helen O'Connell of Hornell October 22, 1918, the ceremony being performed by the late Msgr. Walter J. Lee at St. Patrick's Church.
Surviving are: his widow; three brothers, Charles, Thomas and Edmund, all of Corning; three aunts, Miss Elizabeth Reilhan of Corning, Mrs. L. A. Hand of Bath and Mrs. Edmund Brown of Columbia, Mo., and several cousins.

Corning — The funeral of John Raymond Tremaine, infant son of Robert and Mary Lou Sutton Tremaine of 79 W. First St., was held Monday morning, Dec. 3, 1956. Burial was in St. Mary's Cemetery where the Rev. Hugh Brady, assistant pastor of St. Mary's Church officiated. 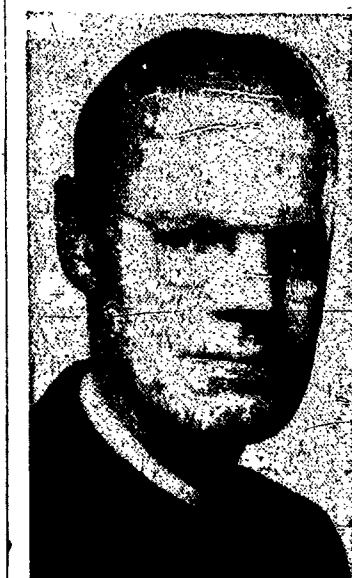
Family Night Held By Scouts

Classmates Attend Rites For Msgr. T. J. McMahon

New York — Solemn Requiem Mass for Msgr. Thomas J. McMahon, 47, pastor of the new Church of Our Saviour, which is under construction here, and former national secretary of the Catholic Near East Welfare Association, was offered in St. Patrick's Cathedral, Dec. 10.

Cobroast of the Mass was Msgr. Charles L. Giblin, pastor of St. Ann's Church, Nyack, N. Y., and the sermon was preached by Msgr. Joseph F. Connolly, pastor of St. John Chrysostom Church in the Bronx.
Attending from Rochester were the Rt. Rev. Msgr. James C. McAniff, V.G., pastor of St. Mary Church and the Rev. Elmer A. McMahon of the St. Bernard Seminary faculty, classmates of Monsignor McMahon at the North American College.
Msgr. McMahon died in his sleep (Dec. 6, 1956) at his residence here.
He was born in Tuxedo Park, N. Y., on April 5, 1909, the son of James and Elizabeth Brennan McMahon. He attended Cathedral College here and entered St. Joseph Seminary, Dunwoodie, Yonkers, N. Y., in 1928.
In 1930, he went to the North American College in Rome, where he was ordained on December 5, 1933. He received the degree of doctor of sacred theology "summa cum laude" from Rome's Gregorian University in 1935 and the degree of doctor of philosophy from Fordham University in 1936.
While in Rome he attended the Propaganda University and served as secretary to the Sacred Congregation for the Oriental Church.
In August, 1943, the Sacred Congregation for the Oriental Church appointed Father McMahon national secretary of the Catholic Near East Welfare Association. He succeeded Bishop Bryan J. McEntegart, now rector of the Catholic University of America, Washington. Father McMahon, at the time of his appointment, had been professor of Church history at St. Joseph Seminary, Yonkers.
In 1945, Father McMahon was named a Papal Chamberlain with the title of Very Reverend Monsignor and three years later was named a Domestic Prelate with the title of Right Reverend Monsignor. He then went on a four-month relief mission to the Near East and there organized Catholic relief efforts in Israel in Arab Palestine, Jordan, Syria, Lebanon and Egypt.
In 1947, 1948, 1949 and 1953, Monsignor McMahon made strong representations in behalf of the SENEWA to the United Nations secretariate, urging the internationalization of Jerusalem. In June, 1953, Msgr. McMahon was named a Protonotary Apostolic by Pope Pius XII, and in 1954 was named a consultant of the Archdiocese of New York.
In September, 1955, after serving for 12 years, he left the post of national secretary of the Catholic Near East Welfare Association. Cardinal Spellman appointed him pastor of the new Church of Our Saviour.

'Geneva Not A Ghost Town' Says Pastor
Geneva—The loss of some of its industries and the removal of Sampson Air Force Base, "by no means makes Geneva a ghost town," the Rev. Raymond P. Nolan, pastor of St. Stephen Parish told members of the Rosary Society at a holiday gathering at the Knights of Columbus home.
He called attention to the fact that St. Stephen's Building Fund collection has reached the 64 per cent mark in its first year, and that the revenue of both Catholic parishes has been kept up. This, he said, is assurance in itself that Geneva "is not without hope."
