2,797 Men Made Retreats In 1956, Evening Mass To Open New Year

Requested by His Excellency Bishop Kearney, the 1957 Retreat Year for men in the Diocese of Rochester will open with an Evening Mass in St. Joseph Church, 108 Franklin St., Rochester on Tuesday, Jan. 8 beginning at 8 p.m.

A Solemn High Mass will be celebrated by the Very Rev. Thomas Fallon, C.S.S.R., rector of the Notre Dame Retreat House with the Rev. William Jamison, C.S.S.R., deacon and the Rev. Edward Conant, C.S.S.R., subdeacon. The sermon will be preached by Father Jamison, known widely throughout the diocese for his promotion of the lay retreat.

A CAPACITY attendance is expected according to Leo B. Johnston, president of the Laymen's Retreat League and the men are asked to receive Holy Communion.

To receive Holy Communion fasting must be three hours previously from solid food, one hour from liquids and fasting from the previous midnight from alcoholic liquids.

Because of the increased attendance at previous beginnings of the retreat year, in the nature of a Communion breakfast, to the point where it was too much to be handled, the Evening Mass will be held instead, President Johnston said.

The lay leader joins with Bishop Kearney in asking that every retreatant from the Diocese of Rochester will make an effort to attend the opening Mass. Parish leaders are asked to turn out the men in their parishes.

THE YEAR 1956 was an outstanding one in attendance at the closed weekend retreats held at the Notre Dame Retreat House, 246 Alexander St., Rochester, conducted by the Redemptorist Fathers. Officers of the league report a total of 2,797 men made the retreat during the past year, a total of 1,200 more than in 1955.

Five parishes had commendable attendance records as follows: St. Ambrose, 94; Blessed Sacrament, 90; St. Francis Xavier, 86; St. Charles Borromeo, 85 and Sacred Heart Cathedral, 84. Parishes in every section of the Diocese sent retreatants to the Notre Dame Retreat House during 1956. Eastern Rite parishes were represented and special groups including doctors' and social workers helped to swell the total, Johnston said.

WEEKEND RETREATS in the Rochester diocese have been increasingly attracting men from the time they were conducted at St. Bernard Seminary, than at the retreat house on Seneca Lake.

Extra-Curricular Activities Topic At Basilian Meet

Extra-curricular Activities, their purpose and place in Higher Education, was the theme of the tenth annual Christmas Educational Conference of the Basilian Fathers which was held in Carr Hall, St. Michael's College, Toronto, on Thursday and Friday, Dec. 27-28.

Priests from four Basilian Colleges and nine Basilian High Schools were in attendance. Aquinas Institute was represented by Father Ernest P. Magee, C.S.B., Principal; Father Leon Hart, C.S.B., Vice-Principal; and Fathers Albert Butler, C.S.B., and Michael Bondi, C.S.B., Fathers Wilfred J. Dwyer, C.S.B., and John Cavanaugh, C.S.B., were delegates from St. John Fisher College.

Rev. Dr. Gerald B. Phelan, Professor of Philosophy in St. Michael's College, University of Toronto, opened the Conference with a paper on "The End of Education and Extra-Curricular Activities." This was followed by a question period after which the Conference began the study of subjects outlined in Father Phelan's introductory address.

Father Alfred P. Caird, C.S.B., of the University of St. Thomas, Houston, Texas, led a panel discussion on "The Academic Core of the Curriculum and Extra-curricular Activities." Members of this panel were: Father Francis J. McCarty, C.S.B., Principal of St. Charles College, Sudbury; Father Hart, C.S.B., Vice-Principal of Aquinas; and Father Patrick J. Gorman, C.S.B., Councillor of St. Michael's College School, Toronto.

The conclusions reached in the discussions were formulated by a panel consisting of Father Richard Sheehan, C.S.B., Principal of St. Paul's High School, Saskatoon, Saskatchewan; Father Matthew P. Sheedy, C.S.B., Assistant Director of Athletics at Assumption High School, Windsor; Father Gerald T. Gregoire, C.S.B., of St. Mary's Boys' High School, Calgary, Alberta, and Father Arthur R. Looby, C.S.B., Treasurer of St. Thomas High School, Houston, Texas.

Very Rev. C. B. Flahiff, C.S.B., Superior General of the Basilian Fathers, summarized the findings of the Conference in his closing address.

Signs Of Priestly Calling Discussed By Basilians

The signs by which a vocation to the priesthood can be distinguished in boys and young men was the subject of the annual vocation meeting in Brennan Hall, St. Michael's College, Toronto, on Saturday, December 29th.

Very Rev. G. B. Flahiff, C.S.B., Superior General of the Basilian Fathers said there were certain qualities and gifts without which a vocation cannot be fulfilled. To help young Basilian teachers recognize these in their early stages he asked three speakers to present views based on experience and reflection.

"CONSISTENT disregard of spiritual resources was a sign of no vocation," declared Father F. J. McCarty, C.S.B., Principal of St. Charles College, Sudbury. His experience as a High School teacher and administrator led him to place great importance on regularity in attendance at Mass and Benediction as a general sign of a vocation.

Father D. L. Forestell, C.S.B., assistant pastor of Holy Rosary Church, Toronto, stressed the importance of the family background. "Families in which there is a strong faith, families that give wholehearted cooperation to the projects of their Bishop and their pastor are a good source of vocations." Homes in which the mother did not manage well, in which the father was imprudent, rarely gave good vocations to the Church.

Father T. J. McGuire, C.S.B., Spiritual Director of St. Basil's Novitiate, Rochester, New York, asked vocation directors to emphasize the supernatural aspect of a vocation, that it was working for God.

Other speakers included Father W. O. Regan, C.S.B., Aquinas Institute, and Father J. R. Cavanaugh, C.S.B., St. John Fisher College.
