Reds Taunt Free World's Failure To Aid Hungary

Gratification is expressed by the Communists of the world that the Kadar puppet "government" in Hungary has "weathered the storm" while the free world fails to implement its condemnation of Kadar's barbarism.

This gratification is to be found in the New Times of November 15, when it writes: "The Soviet people are confident that the most difficult days are over in Hungary. Now that they have repelled the assault of the counter-revolution, the Hungarian people are bringing life back to normal and will continue the building of socialism, interrupted by the recent events."

The Moscow organ can quote in its support the statement by the Assistant Secretary General of the Italian (left wing) Socialist Party that "we stand by our Communist comrades in Hungary, the victims of unbridled reaction." It can say that this is "the only position any progressive can take in relation to the Hungarian events."

It is in this wise that "history" is being written by the Soviet apologists, representing the Hungarian patriots as "murderous gangs," led by "landowner, shareholders, and worthy officers" and backed by the West imperialists, specifically the United States.

THE GREAT part played by workers and students in the patriotic Hungarian uprising, even to the point of extensive strikes against the Communist regime, is to be glossed over and cloaked with the charge of "reaction." And all of this, as the New Times reveals, is for the purpose of intimidating the United Nations into doing nothing worth while toward "unlawfully interfering in Hungary's internal affairs."

This intimidation has so far been successful. The United Nations have not even been able to impose sanctions on Soviet Russia or Red Hungary or to compel these regimes from membership for their flagrant defiance of the UN resolution of December 15.

The Daily Worker gives vent to the satisfaction of the Communists here at the "victory" of the Kadar set-up, doing so in a number of issues but particularly in that of December 24. There it is so moved by glee at the course of Hungarian events that it derides the visit of Vice President Richard Nixon to the refugee camps as "the flight of the bumblebee" carried out for purely political purposes.

It recommends that "if Nixon really wanted to do something for the people of Hungary, he could back the proposals for withdrawal of all foreign troops from both Western and Eastern Europe." That demand stated repeatedly before by the Daily Worker, has now become the Soviet theme song.

We cannot afford to forget, in reviewing these events, the part played by the Communist Tito of Yugoslavia in forwarding the slaughter of the Hungarian people. Even though it is by way of repetition, it cannot be overlooked that at the decisive moment on November 4, when Soviet troops massacred the people, Tito gave approval to this act. His excuse was that it was by this means that "Socialism" could be saved.

Since there is much talk of Tito's being invited to the United States, we might inquire as to why this dictator was so interested in "saving Socialism." It will give a correct measurement of his purposes and will show that Tito's coming to the United States would be an indirect approval of the Hungarian massacres and a great boon to the Communist cause throughout the world.

Fortunately we are currently supplied with an official explanation of Tito's own thinking, which appears in the December and January issues of Mainstream, the Communist publica-

tion for intellectuals in this country. It consists of a reprinting of a speech made two years ago by Edward Kardelj, "Vice President" of Yugoslavia. The title: "Socialist Democracy in Yugoslavia."

In this document, Kardelj sets forth that Tito's government is based on Communist concepts, stating specifically that it derives its principles and practices, from the teachings of Karl Marx, and that it will never return to "the classic bourgeois forms of political democracy which prevail in Western Europe."

Kardelj openly proclaims Tito's Communist path to the very "withering away of the State," which he declared Red Yugoslavia is "preparing for" in advance. This statement is a dead give-away, if any more were needed. For, from the Communist viewpoint, this "withering away" cannot occur until the world's Soviet dictatorship is assured.

What Kardelj does try to show is that Tito has brought about an "economic democracy" which rides itself of bureaucratism. He seeks to venerate the arbitrary dictatorship in Yugoslavia with the claim that the workers have a voice on what is done at a local level.

How fictitious is this "democracy" has just been demonstrated by the arrest and imprisonment of Milovan Djilas, former high-ranking Communist, for writing an article in which he criticized the rank bureaucratism, the slavery of the workers, and the oppression existing under Tito. Further testimony has just come from Jacob Levi - former foreign editor of Tito's official Communist daily, Borba (Struggle) - who has repudiated Communism and sought asylum in the United States.

Perhaps a strong expression from every part of the country will prevent the jaiber of Archbishop Stepinac from being received with honors in this country.

Historic Church Shelters Refugees

Fairfax Station, Va. (RNS) — An historic Roman Catholic church which provided a haven for refugees following the First Battle of Bull Run in 1861 is again fulfilling this role. St. Mary's church is sheltering 23 Hungarian refugees in its parish hall until jobs and apartments can be found for them.

(Continued from Page 1) — pastor of Holy Cross church, made his accusation at a news conference in the church rectory during which he attacked the sale of obscene books, pamphlets and pictures in the city.

At first declining to name the councilman he accused, Msgr. McCaffrey later identified him as Daniel S. Weiss (D-Man.). "Everyone is entitled to an attorney," he said, "but it seems strange that a responsible city official would accept these cases."

"There may be a fix in there somewhere," he added.

Msgr. McCaffrey said he was prompted to speak out because of the "increasing flood of lewd, lascivious, and pornographic books, pamphlets and pictures" in Times Square.

"The legislature is not at fault - the law is there," he said. "The police are not at fault - they make the raids."

The priest said he knew of four to six book stores in Times Square that had been raided during the last year.

"Time and time again these cases go to court and that's the end of it," he said.

Son of the late Julius and Mary Wirth Winterroth, Father Winterroth leaves his priest-brother, Father Seraphim, provincial of the Capuchin Fathers' Eastern Province at Providence, R. I. He is survived by two other brothers, Adolph H. and Carl R. and two sisters, Mrs. Stella Hesselink and Mrs. Rufus E. Maier, and several nieces and nephews, all of Rochester.

FATHER WINTERROTH was born in Rochester on June 12, 1896. He attended St. Francis Xavier School and was a graduate of St. Andrew and St. Bernard Seminaries.

Ordained on June 10, 1922 by the late Bishop Thomas F. Hickey, Father Winterroth was appointed assistant pastor of St. Michael Church, Rochester where he served for 13 years. He became pastor of Our Lady of the Lake Church, King Ferry and All Saints Church, Ludlowville, in 1935.

In 1940 Father Winterroth was named pastor of St. Theresa Church, Stanley and St. Mary Church, Rushville and in 1942 he became pastor of St. John the Baptist parish on the retirement of the late Rev. John B. Stemmler.

Father Winterroth was a member of St. George Commandery No. 43, Knights of St. John of St. Michael Church, Rochester, Elmira Council, Knights of Columbus and Elmira Fourth Degree Assembly.

Father Winterroth was brought to the Rufus F. Maier Funeral Home in Rochester on Tuesday and plans had called for the body to be taken to Elmira on Thursday afternoon to lie in state in the parish church. When Thursday's snow storm prevented the return to Elmira, it was decided to hold the funeral rites in St. Michael's, Rochester, where Father Winterroth had served as an assistant priest.

OFFICE of the Dead was recited by priests of the Diocese on Thursday night in St. Michael's Church.

'No New War' Says German Cardinal

Cologne, Germany (NC) — "We enter the new year with firm confidence that by God's grace a new world war will be avoided," His Eminence Josef Cardinal Frings, Archbishop of Cologne, said in his New Year's Day sermon.

Speaking to a large congregation crowding the restored cathedral here, the Cardinal said that "no nation has any use for a major war, because all know that modern warfare will leave neither victors nor vanquished, but only a general destruction and perhaps doom for the entire human race."

Divorce Rate High In Poland

London (RNS) — Latest statistics show that Poland has the highest divorce rate of any country in Europe, next to West Germany, the Warsaw Radio reported. It said the causes were "lack of morals and promiscuity."

Juvenile Judge Warns Dealers

East Chicago, Ind. — (RNS) — A juvenile court judge who took office Jan. 1 has declared open warfare on Lake County magazine dealers displaying or selling obscene reading matter.

Judge Joseph Meszar of the Lake County Juvenile Court, who lives here, indicated he plans to charge such dealers with contributing to the delinquency of minors.

The judge said that when he receives a report of obscene literature being sold or displayed for sale he plans to dispatch a probation officer to investigate, and then act on the basis of the investigation.

By charging dealers with contributing to the delinquency of minors, he said, it is possible to escape entanglement in the legalities of defining what is obscene. Definition of the term has caused the enforcement of decent literature laws throughout the country to fall, he observed.

"It is much easier to decide on the issue of contributing to the delinquency of children than it is for a court to decide the question of obscenity," Judge Meszar added. "In this sense, then, enforcement of indecent literature laws can be facilitated."
