

St. Gerard Majella Area Doctors Urged To Back Appeal Asking Pope To Name 'Mother's Saint'

An appeal for area Catholic doctors to join in a worldwide petition asking Pope Pius XII to officially proclaim St. Gerard Majella the 'Patron of Catholic Mothers," was made this week in Rochester by the Redemptorist Fathers who staff St. Joseph's Church.

ST. GERARD was a Redemp torist lay-brother, famed for his holiness. He was canonized a saint in 1904 by Pope Pius X. Although the Church has not officially designated him as the patron saint of mothers he is popularly known as "the Mother's Saint" because of the widespread practice of invoking his blessing for the safety of mothers and children, particularly in cases of childbirth -

On January 30th according to the Rochester Redemptorists, their Superior General in Rome, the Very Revelend William Gaudreau will present a petition to the Holy Father asking him to officially name St. Gerard the "Patron of Mothers." The petition will stress the Saint's reputed care of expectant mothers who impoke his protection

To support his petition the Redemptorist Superior General wil carry to the Pope letters testifying to the blessings which Catholic mothers have received through the devotion to St. Gerard.

"Catholic mothers-to-be in all parts of the world have come to look on St. Gerard as their special patron. There is hardly a Catholic hospital in the United States that does not have a shrine to St. Gerard in the maternity section. Many doctors have had personal experience in their practice of the spiritual and physical good this devotion accomplishes."

Area doctors are urged by the Redemptorists to join their petitions with the thousands of






