## Central Dictating System Installed In Homell Hospital

Homell—A system of Centralized Dictation has been established in the Medical Records Library of St. James Mercy Hospital. The recent installation of the Dictaphone Telecord Dictating Machine combines expediency with efficiency and provides up-to-date and complete type-written hospital records.

The new system is small, compact, modern and simple to operate. Three dictation telephones are accessible in the clinical conference rooms on each floor of the hospital. Here the Doctor may dictate his record which is later transcribed by a member of the Medical Records Library Staff.

**THE MEDICAL STAFF** has responded favorably to this system.

In summarizing the benefits derived by this system to the hospital and to the physicians, Dr. Leon Roe of the staff said: "The new dictaphone recently purchased by the hospital for use by the physicians in dictating the medical and scientific records of the patient is a real advance in modern record keeping; first, it saves each attending physician a great deal of time since he obviously can dictate much more rapidly than he can write; second, this method creates a close uniformity in all records, thereby increasing the efficiency of the Record Rooms filing and recording. Installing this improvement in recording information, patient care is thereby improved."

## Father Smith Addresses First Saturday Luncheon

"The first thing we read of our Blessed Lady is that she was a prayer. You should be women of prayer—not in the manner of a show-off, but in an interior way. It is written of Mary that her Divine Son, advanced in grace and wisdom and knowledge in her home.
