

'Waterfront Priest' Takes Post At LeMoyné College

New York—(RNS)—New York's famed "waterfront priest," convinced he has done "all he could" to clean up the longshore community, has been transferred at his own request to a teaching post in Syracuse, N. Y.

The Rev. John M. Corridan, S. J., will teach labor economics at Le Moyné College.

FATHER CORRIDAN was appointed associate director of the Xavier Institute of Industrial Relations in 1945, after his ordination as a priest of the Society of Jesus. Since then he has worked unceasingly to eliminate the evils which virtually enslave workers in the world's busiest port.

His superior, the Rev. Philip A. Carey, S. J., director of the Institute, said Father Corridan "felt he had done all he could" to clean up waterfront conditions.

"Many of the reforms he suggested have been put into effect," many of the evils that existed.

A consistent foe of the International Longshoremen Association, which he considered to be no union at all, Father Corridan counseled and supported the 1951 strike by members against the contract negotiated by Joseph P. Ryan, former ILA president.

ALTHOUGH THE strike was unsuccessful, it focused the attention of former Gov. Thomas E. Dewey on waterfront conditions and eventually led to the establishment of the Bi-State Waterfront Commission.

Father Corridan said he believed that the port's dock workers were better off today than ever before. He added that the Waterfront Commission has ended

Former Mother Superior Requiem Mass Conducted

Solemn Mass of Requiem was held for Sister Mary Mechtild Hart, a former mother superior of the Sisters of Mercy, in the order's motherhouse chapel in Rochester last Tuesday, Jan. 15.

Sister Mechtild, superior at Our Lady of Mt. Carmel School, Rochester for 40 years, died Jan. 12, 1957 after a long illness.

The Rt. Rev. Msgr. Charles J. Azz, pastor of Mt. Carmel Church, celebrated the funeral Mass, assisted by Father William M. Hart, deacon, and Father Richard Hart, subdeacon, both nephews of the deceased.

HIS EXCELLENCY Bishop Walter A. Foery of Syracuse was present in the sanctuary, and gave the final absolution. Sister Mechtild was born in Corning and entered the Sisters of Mercy in 1884 at Batavia. She took her vows in St. Ann Church, Hornell in 1887.

She served as a teacher in Oswego and Corning and became the first superior at Our Lady of Mt. Carmel School when it opened in 1909 as Rochester's first American-Italian school.

From 1934 to 1937, Sister Mechtild served as mother superior of the Sisters of Mercy. She retired in 1952 because of ill health.

SURVIVING are several nieces and nephews including the Rt. Rev. Msgr. William M. Hart, P.A.; V.G., pastor of Corpus Christi Church.

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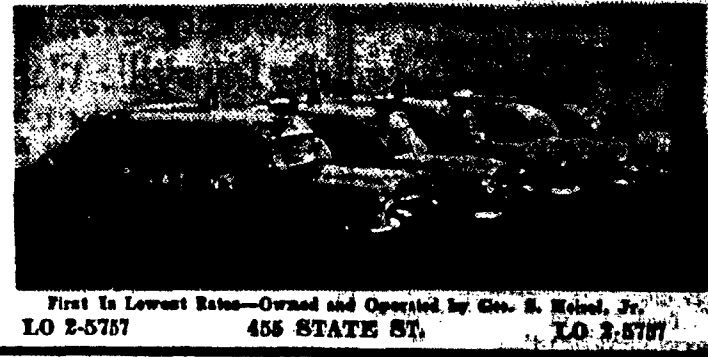
Hilton Parish Lists Spaghetti Supper
