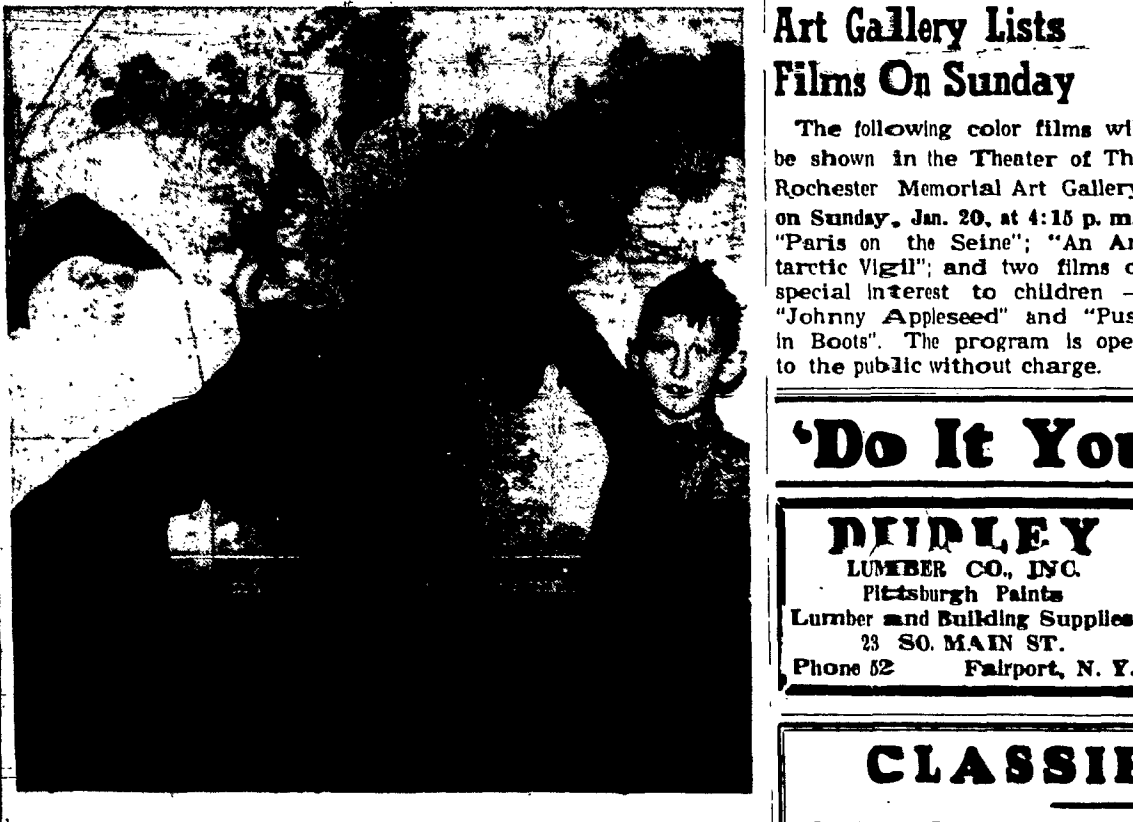


Dutch Children 'Discover' America
