

### Science Career Night Planned At Aquinas

Science Career Night, a program devoted to informing high school students and their parents about science as a career, will be held at Aquinas Institute, Friday, Feb. 8, at 8 p.m. in the gymnasium, announced by the Aquinas Science Department.

The program is presented by the Rochester Council of Scientific Societies and will include a panel of speakers to cover the fields of chemistry, physics, biology and engineering. Rev. John Wilson, C.S.B., head of the Aquinas science department, will serve as moderator of the panel.

THE PROFESSIONAL experts will present to the students, in a question-and-answer session, the various areas in science and types of work that can ultimately result by pursuing a course of studies in one or more of the fields discussed.

The members of the panel will be: chemistry, Dr. Henry Curme of the Kodak Park research section; physics, Dr. Nissen A. Finkestein of the Bausch and Lomb scientific bureau; biology, Dr. Dirk Benson of the New York State Conservation Department; engineering, Dr. Shelby Miller of the University of Rochester chemical engineering department.

Buffalo Sit Alone and Lone Chief, the two Northwest Indians of the nine Indian lands attending New York City schools on Marquette League grants, won the highest scholastic records of the group during the year's first semester.

Buffalo Sit Alone, a 14 year old Freshman from Wyoming is a member in St. Ann Academy. He missed the School's Medal by one point (he's the only Indian in his class). His average was 83.

Donald Lone Chief, a Sioux from South Dakota, made 81.5 points. Monsignor Bernard Cullen, director of the Marquette League believes that one way of solving the Indian problem is to give promising Indian lands special educational advantages so that they may later return to their respective reservations and help their people in their fight for economic independence.

### Hungarian Girls Offered 2 Grants

Nazareth College of Rochester has offered two full tuition scholarships to Hungarian girls, according to Sister Rose Angela, dean, this week.

This offer was made at the suggestion of the local committee through Pax Romana, International Movement of Catholic Students, whose general secretariate is in Fribourg, Switzerland. A letter received from Thom Kerstiens, General Secretary of Pax Romana indicates that the scholarship offer has been made known to the Pax Romana groups in Austria, Belgium and the United States, with the request that suitable candidates be contacted.

Due to lack of residence facilities, it will be impossible for Nazareth College to accommodate Hungarian students on campus at this time, but arrangements will be made in homes in the college area where the students can earn their board and room.

### 3 Million Dollar Building Slated At St. Bonaventure

St. Bonaventure, N. Y. — A \$3,000,000 Building and Development Program at St. Bonaventure University has been announced by the Very Rev. Brian Lhota, OFM, University president.

In his announcement, Father Lhota disclosed that the University's board of trustees had authorized the increase in the school's debt at this time to meet the needs of the ever-increasing student body.

The proposed project, to coincide with the University's year-long centennial program which starts next October 4, will include the construction of a 40-room arts building and a 100-room library.

ENROLLMENT AT St. Bonaventure has increased by 20% in the past two years, taxing to the limit all available classroom space. War-time emergency classroom buildings still being used are beyond repair from a sound economic standpoint. The university has reached the point where it cannot continue to give full service without a larger plant, Father Lhota said.

He added that construction of a friary will release space in Devereux Hall, a student residence, for about 200 more boarding students. Since 1930, when fire destroyed St. Bonaventure's Church, Monastery, and Seminary, the more than 90 Franciscan priests who staff the university have been residing in Devereux.

The proposed buildings will be modern in design, blending with the traditional style of present campus buildings. Each of the new buildings will be three stories high and will be faced with brick.

### Ex-Rochesterian Acts As CYO Trouble Shooter

Patrick J. O'Reilly, former Rochesterian and a graduate of Aquinas Institute, is currently serving as a group work specialist in the Catholic Youth Organization in Los Angeles.

His full-time job is working with difficult teenagers. O'Reilly described his work by telling of a typical group of 18 boys ranging in age from 12 to 15 years. The group took no part in the CYO program — except to beat up other kids.

Members of the gang had been involved in gang fights, stealing, drunkenness and sex delinquency.

O'REILLY OBTAINED the names of the boys, met them, tried to discover their interests and slowly began to win their confidence. It took a year and a half before the group could be turned over to a regular CYO worker.

By this time only six of the original 18 were left. Six others were doing quite well in school, but six others had become wards of the California Youth Authority.

O'Reilly attended St. Bonaventure University and obtained his bachelor's degree from Loyola University and his master's degree from the University of Southern California.
