

## Chevron Awards Planned At Volunteer Aides' Tea; Hospital Movie Slated

Annual reception and tea given for the volunteer aides of St. Mary's Hospital will be held Saturday afternoon, Jan. 26 in the lounge of the Nurses' Home, Mrs. Leo F. Simpson, Jr., chairman of the Women's Board which sponsors the group, will lead the volunteers in a renewal of their pledge of loyalty.

Mrs. Frederick C. Moser, chairman of the volunteer aide service of the Board, will preside at the business meeting, at which time Sister Martina, hospital administrator, will present chevrons to those fulfilling a required number of hours in 1956. Highlighting the afternoon will be the showing of the film, "The Dedicated," produced by the Catholic Hospital Association of the United States and Canada.

"The Dedicated" issued to point out effectively how the modern Catholic hospital utilizes the developments of science and medicine through the ages to enhance, rather than decrease, the Christian concept of the Dignity of Man and Charity toward All. It is said to be a brief history of the Catholic hospital since the time of Christ Himself, and shows its role in providing care for the sick and in the future through research and teaching as well as direct care of the acutely ill today.

**AMONG SPECIFIC** scenes from modern hospitals are the childbirth, heart surgery and preparation for that surgery, care of the victims of chronic disease and such cripples as Cerebral Palsy and Polio. Also shown are dramatic scenes from the Missions where the knowledge gained in Catholic hospitals of the U.S. and Canada is being applied to rescue thousands from the abyss of ignorance and superstition.

Following the film, Sister Martina and the Sisters of Charity, assisted by the Women's Board, will be hostesses. In the assembled group, Mrs. John T. O'Hara is hospitality chairman. Registration of boys and girls for Camp Stella Maris will open Friday, Feb. 1, the camp office announced today. The 1957 season will mark the 31st year for the diocesan camp which has grown to be one of the largest camps in central and western New York State.

With the remodeling of the largest cabin and the addition of a new cabin, Stella Maris is prepared to accommodate a capacity enrollment of 135 boys for two one-week and two two-week encampments and the same number of girls for a two week and a one week encampment.

Last summer, 774 boys and girls of elementary school age enjoyed camping at its best on Conesus Lake. Camp officials expect more than 800 children this summer.

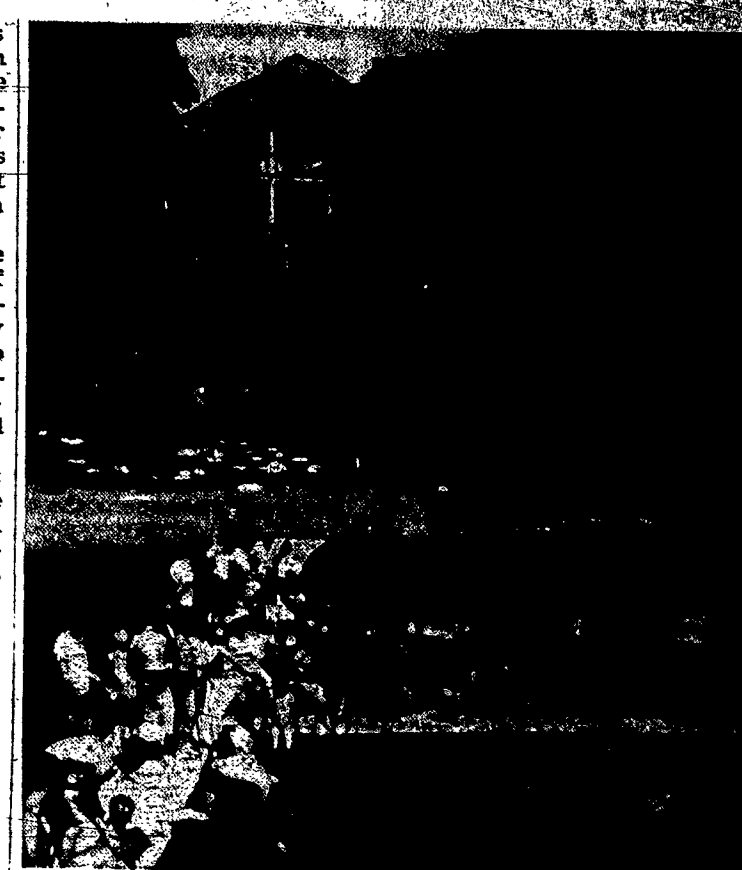
