

Funeral Rites Conducted For 4 Persons In Corning

Corning—Funeral services for four persons in the Corning area were conducted this past week. Accounts of the funerals follow:

High Mass of Requiem was celebrated in the Immaculate Heart of Mary Church in Painted Post Tuesday morning for Frank Bonady, 40, of Gipsdenn Creek Rd., Town of Lindley, and a well known Corning businessman, who died at 5:30 a.m. last Saturday following a heart attack.

Mr. Bonady was proprietor of the Wilbridge Hotel in Corning, and was associated with several other business enterprises in the city.

Burial took place in St. Mary's Cemetery in Corning.

Although he had been in ill health for the past year, he was about the community until about 10 days before his death, at which time he was ordered to bed by his physician. He suffered the heart seizure at 1 a.m. at his home and died five hours later.

Mr. Bonady was born in Pennsylvania on March 30, 1916, the

son of Mrs. Michael Bonady of 141 Hillvue Avenue and the late Mr. Bonady. He came to Corning with his family as a boy and attended Northside schools and was graduated from Northside High School.

A veteran of World War II, Mr. Bonady served with the First Armored Division in the European Theatre. He saw duty in Italy, Germany and Africa.

He was married to the former Mary Lando about 1945. Mrs. Bonady's mother, Mrs. Samuel Lando of 121 Davis Street died this past week.

Mr. Bonady was an officer of Westwood Heights, Inc. He was also a stockholder of Radio Corning, Inc.

Mr. Bonady was a member of the Immaculate Heart of Mary Church in Painted Post, and of Corning Country Club.

Surviving are his wife; three children, Tony, Michele and Patrick, at home; his mother, Mrs. Jessie Bonady; four brothers, John, Joseph, Michael and William, of Painted Post; Patrick of Gang Mills and Joseph of Corning; three sisters, Mrs. Graydon Kirkland of Painted Post; Mrs. Joseph Cannon and Mrs. Louis Benvenuti of Corning.

Following prayers at the A. W. Bell and son funeral home Monday morning of this week, Requiem Mass was offered in St. Mary's Church for Henry Geisler, 72, of 114 W. Third St. Burial was in St. Mary's Cemetery.

Mr. Geisler was found dead in his home the previous Thursday afternoon by his sister, Mrs. Louis Walter of State St. A sister, Margaret, who resided with Mr. Geisler, died Jan. 17.

He was born in White Mills, Pa. January 27, 1884, the son of August and Barbara Geisler. He had been with Corning Glass Works for 47 years in the Steuben Division. Mr. Geisler was a communicant of St. Mary's Church.

Surviving are: two sisters, Mrs. Mary Aug of West Third Street and Mrs. Walter; several nieces and nephews.

The funeral of Mrs. Jennie Lando, wife of Samuel Lando of 121 Davis St., was held at 10 a.m. Saturday morning. Following prayers at the A. W. Bell and son funeral home, Solemn High Mass was offered in St. Vincent de Paul's Church. Burial took place in St. Mary's Cemetery.

Indonesian Bishops OK Army Service

Jakarta, Indonesia (NC)—At the request of the Indonesian government, the bishops of Indonesia sent to officials their views concerning the proposed new law governing universal military service in Indonesia.

The bishops expressed approval of the law, with the stipulation that all priests and members of religious orders be exempted from military service.

They declared, however, that they have no objection to priests and male religious serving as chaplains or in any other way which would benefit the fighting forces, so long as they would not be required to do anything not befitting their station as clerics.

The ministry of war has acceded to the wishes of the bishops and promised to be guided by their wishes in framing the new law.
