### Parish Credit Unions Cite Gains

Madison, Wis. (RNS) - A total of 1,021 credit unions are operated by Roman Catholic parishes in the United States, Canada and the Caribbean area, according to a report issued by the Credit Union National Association here. It said 91 new unions were organized during 1956, the largest number in any single year.

Some 677 of the credit unions are in the U.S., 304 in Canada and the rest in the Dominican Republic, Puerto Rico, Alaska and British West Indies, the report stated.

Credit unions are associations of people with a common bond, such as the same church affiliation, who save their money together and lend to each other at low cost.
