\$150,000 Fund Campaign Planned For Canandaigua Parish Improvements

The Rev. Alphonsus P. Crummins, pastor of St. Mary Parish in Canandaigua, outlined the purposes and aims of the present \$150,000 school building fund campaign to over 200 men gathered in the parish hall last Thursday evening.

The \$150,000 goal represents the minimum amount needed to proceed with the erection of four new classrooms, and an auditorium complete with stage and all necessary facilities. A complete renovation of the present overcrowded school is also planned.

THE FIRM of Martin McGraw & Ward architects of Rochester, have designed the new edifice which will be situated on the present property adjacent to the old school and facing on Brook and Gibson Streets. It will be of red brick and concrete construction to conform with the old school buildings. When completed it will contain every modern improvement in school furnishings.

Father Crummins told the men "He had every confidence in them and the people of St. Mary's, who he said 'Have not failed in any parish endeavor in the 112 year history of the parish'.

The special 2018 committee under the leadership of the Honorable Edward J. Colney and Albert C. Burke will inaugurate a pre-campaign solicitation of 150 special gifts prospectus, Sunday, Feb. 21 between 1:30 and 3:30 p.m. General solicitation of the parish starts a week later.

The campaign is being conducted by Foley Associates of Rochester, and is on a three-year pledge basis. The parishioners will be encouraged to designate their preference as to the payment of their pledges. Some may prefer to pay on a weekly basis, others monthly, quarterly or yearly.

There will be more than 100 memoranda available in the new school for any individual or family. A memorial will be considered as their pledge to the campaign. No other gift is expected.

T. Hamilton Kennedy, general chairman, and himself a graduate of St. Mary School congratulated his fellow chairmen and division leaders for what he termed a magnificent example of Catholic Action. He pointed out they had enrolled 250 men on a 200 men

The Rev. Walter J. Kohl, pastor has announced the following plans for the renovation and re-decoration of the parish buildings.

Renovation and re-tinting of the altars, purchase of new Stations of the Cross, recarpeting of the church aisles, general exterior repainting, a new rectory roof and general interior decoration, installation of new lighting and blackboards in the school, re-furnishing and modernization of the school hall and kitchen, a new roof for the school, installation of a public address system in the school, purchase of new banquet and card tables, a new convent roof, complete redecoration of the convent chapel and altar, and the re-furnishing of the present convent bedrooms.

The temporary campaign offices have been set up in the school on Walnut St. telephone Green field 3-6330. Leo E. DeVany of Foley Associates Inc., Rochester fund-raising counsel is assisting the committees during the campaign.

400 Students Get Salk Shots

Salk polio shots will be administered at St. John Fisher College to students and staff on Thursday morning, Feb. 21 in the college auditorium.

The Rev. Frank DeSales Flood, C.S.B., faculty moderator announced that more than 400 students and staff will receive the first vaccine shots. Included in this number are about 165 students from Nazareth College.

Dr. John F. McCabe, consulting physician of St. John Fisher College will give the vaccine assisted by senior nursing students from Nazareth College.

The second shots will be given the same group on Thursday, March 14. The third shot which must follow no sooner than seven months after the second will be given next fall.

Penfield Church Dedication Slated

Dedication of the new St. Joseph Church on Gebhardt Road, Penfield with His Excellency, Auxiliary Bishop Casey conducting the ceremony will take place on Sunday, Feb. 24, at 11 a. m. according to the Rev. John D. Malley, pastor.

Bishop Casey will preside at the Mass to be celebrated by Father Malley and preach the sermon.

THE CHURCH will seat about 420 persons. Furnishings are of contemporary design. The main altar of white mahogany and oak will feature a hand carved Crucifix from Germany. Stations of the Cross are hand-carved.

Pews are of blond oak. The altar railing is of wrought iron and light oak. The side altar on the Gospel side is in honor of the Blessed Virgin and on the Epistle side, in honor of St. Joseph. They have statues of imported wood that are hand-carved.

Confessionals are of natural wood and the windows have antique style tint glass. Beams feature Western fir wood.

The baptistry in the main foyer connecting church and school has a baptismal font of marble enclosed by decorative wrought iron. The floor is of Vermont slate. Parking will be provided for 150 cars.

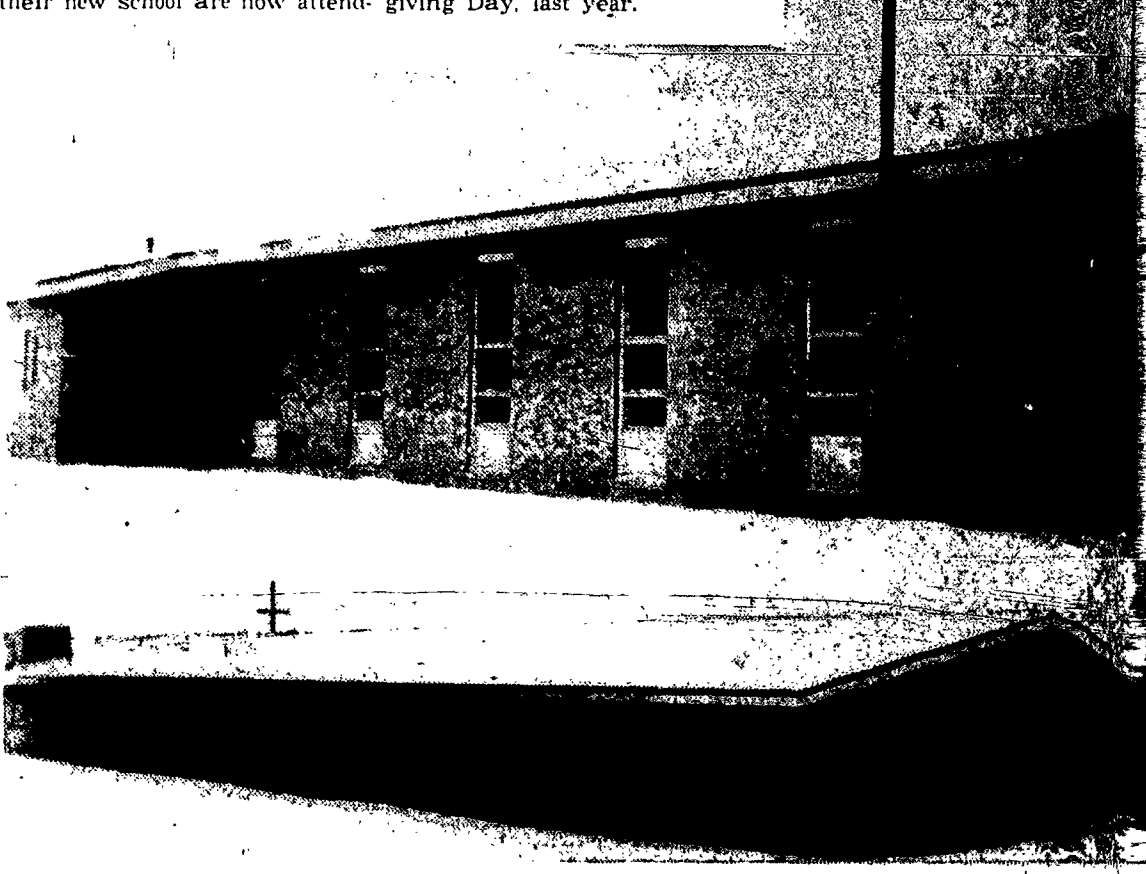
THE NEW school provides four classrooms and in the administrative section, the principal's office, nursery room, conference and storage rooms. Latest chalk boards and children's ven-

tilated wardrobes are installed. Sister M. Damian of the Sisters of Mercy is principal and Sister Nicholas, first grade teacher in the school opening next week with two grades. A third grade will be added in September.

The L-shaped church and school building was designed by architects Waasdrop and Northrup, Edward Ribson associated. Le Cesse Corp. is general contractor. Children of St. Joseph parish awaiting the completion of their new school are now attend-

ing St. Jerome School in East Rochester.

The need for the new church and school was realized in September, 1954, when a census was conducted of the families in the rapidly growing parish. A successful campaign for funds was conducted in March, 1955, and groundbreaking took place on the site, north side of Gebhardt road, just west of Five Mile Line Road in Penfield, on April 1, 1956. The cornerstone was laid Thanksgiving Day, last year.

Academy Nun Authors Article

Sister Marie Lawrence, S.S.J., teacher of clothing in the Nazareth Academy home economic department, is the author of an article, "Clothing inventories of 41 Teen Age Girls," appearing in the Journal of Home Economics for February, 1957.

The article is a summary of Sister's thesis written as part of a requirement for master of science degree from Cornell University.

Questions such as the following are answered in the summary: Who selects and purchases teenage girls' clothes? How many clothes have they? How much do individual items cost? What is the total cost of the wardrobe? and, What is the yearly cost of the wardrobe. Also, relationships are shown as that between the number of garments and the total cost of the wardrobe.

Testing for the thesis was carried on at Nazareth Academy through questionnaires and inventory sheets distributed to 41 students of homemaking classes.
