International Theatre Month Marked By St. Agnes Seniors With 'Lute Song' Production

International Theatre Month will be observed at St. Agnes High School with the production of the annual senior play, "Lute Song." A Chinese classic dating from 1404, the play will be presented on Monday, March 4 in the school auditorium, 300 East River Road.

Aim of International Theatre Month is "the promotion of international understanding through the drama and study of foreign plays that lead to a fuller understanding of the lives and attitudes of other peoples, or of classics that remind us of truths universal despite time and distance."

"LUTE SONG" fits into both these categories according to Sister M. Evelyn S.S.J., director. Adapted and translated for American audiences, it remains a foreign play.

Emphasizing as it does themes of courage, fidelity and filial piety in the face of opposition from the imperial power, Sister Evelyn said, it stands as a reminder of unchanging values and of important truths.

Community cooperation has been secured in the production. Consultation with Martina Pang, Chinese student at Nazareth College, advice and properties from restaurant Lin Far, costumes and scenery from the Ironquilt High School faculty, who spent some years in the Orient, have all combined to aid in the production of "Lute Song."

Report 150,000 Sign Protest On 'Martin Luther' Film Ban

Chicago — (RNS) — The Action Committee for Freedom of Religious Expression reported here that 150,000 persons had signed petitions protesting cancellation of the film "Martin Luther" by Chicago television station WGN-TV.

Dr. John W. Harms, chairman of the committee and executive vice-president of the Church Federation of Greater Chicago, said that additional signatures were pouring in at the rate of 50,000 weekly.

The petitions were sent to the Federal Communications Commission along with a brief by the committee which asked for a public hearing on the television station's action.

Cancellation of the film scheduled for last Dec. 21, the petition said, took place under circumstances which are, in effect, sectarian censorship and a violation of freedom of expression.

"WE PETITION your Commission to do all in its power as an agency of the United States government to correct this injustice," it said, "and to establish such principles and practices for use of the media of mass communications as will guarantee freedom from such censorship whether direct or otherwise."

Supporting the brief filed in Washington were more than 40 Protestant groups, including the Church Federation of Greater Chicago, the National Council of Churches, the National Association of Evangelicals and major Lutheran bodies.
