McCurdy's Opens New Geneva Store To Serve Finger Lakes Region

George E. Shantz Dies, Father Of Priest, Nuns

George E. Shantz, 82, of 173 Meigs St., father of a priest and two nuns, died Tuesday morning, Feb. 26, 1957 at St. Mary's Hospital of a chronic illness.



Funeral services for Mr. Schantz, a retired real estate broker and active in Catholic lay organizations, and brother of the late Rev. Joseph Schantz, C. S. S. R., will be held at 8:30 a.m. today (Friday), March 1 at the home and at 10 a.m. in St. Joseph Church, Rochester. A descendant of a pioneer family dating back to 1814 when his ancestors settled here, Mr. Schantz was born Sept. 25, 1874 in Rochester, son of Gebhard and Elizabeth Klem Schantz. He was the oldest Meigs St. resident and born in the homestead. He was a grandson of the late Bernard Klem who came to America in 1814 with his parents John B. and Anna Mary from Alsace-Lorraine. They were the first German settlers to take up residence in this part of New York State. MR. SHANTZ attended St. Joseph School, Rochester Business Institute and St. Clement College, Saratoga Springs. He joined a wholesale footwear business in 1896 and for 12 years in partnership in it. He entered the real estate business in 1906, retiring 26 years later. He owned the major part of the "Liberty Pole" triangle for a period of 40 years. A life member of St. Joseph's

Church, Mr. Schantz's parents were the first couple to be married with solemn nuptials in 1852. It was in his great-grandfather's home, John B. Klem, on the 10-acre tract bounded by East Ave., Meigs St., Park Ave. and Goodman St. where a Redemptorist Father celebrated the first Mass in Rochester. He was a member of the Archconfraternity of St. Joseph Church, the Holy Name Society, Nocturnal Adoration Society and Mercy Guild of the Little Flower. Mr. Schantz is survived by his son, the Rev. Raymond E. Schantz, C. S. S. R., a Redemptorist in charge of Holy Rosary Church, Richmond, Va.; and seven daughters, Sister Dorothy Marie of the Congregation of the Sisters of St. Joseph; Sister M. Elizabeth, one of the Religious of the Sisters of Mercy; Mrs. George Villard, Mrs. Florence Vick, the Misses Gertrude and Mary Schantz; Mrs. Donald Leahy and seven grandchildren, all residents of Rochester.
