Toronto, Ont. — (RNS)—Plans of the Toronto Telegram to publish a Sunday edition beginning March 17 were denounced by the board of evangelism and social service of the United Church of Canada (Prot-) estant) at its annual meeting

The board served warning that if the Telegram goes ahead with the plans it will ask the attorney general of Ontario province to prosecute, under the Lord's Day Act of Canada, anyone who sells

UNITED CHURCH ministers and members were urged by the board to uphold the act by refusing to buy the Sunday Telegram if and when it appears on the

The board described the Telegram's plans as "flouting the Lord's Day Act." It said the projected Sunday paper would be-"trucked and otherwise delivered" to the newsstands, hotel lobbies, railway anl bus terminals, drugstores and other outlets in

Cardinal Bans 'Rock 'n Roll' In Schools

Chicago -- (RNS) -- Cardinal Stritch, in a Lenten pastoral letter, condemned the use of rock 'n roll music in Catholic high schools and recreation

centers. The Archbishop of Chicago also criticized steady dating among teenagers, saying that "too much familiarity between the adolescent girl and adolescent boy is dangerous and sin-

Cardinal Stritch described rock 'n roll as "tribal rhythms which have a certain vogue in our day." The fact that such dancing and music is permitted in some Catholic high schools and recreation centers. he said, "should bring the blush of shame to Catholic

educators." These schools and centers exist to assist parents in providing their youngsters "with holy ideals and noble thoughts and aspirations," the prelate

"God grant that this word will have the effect of banning such things in Catholic recreation," he added

In general, the Cardinal's letter concerned the need for family sanctification and holfness. He stressed that the family lives in an era of secularizing influences and in a world which daily "is casting aide religious ideals and seeking to substitute humanitari anism for religion.
