A \$22,000 fund drive for the School of the Holy Childhood for mentally retarded children was launched last week at a meeting in the school, 215 Andrews St.

Speaker was City Court Judge Thomas P. Culhane.

John L. Hedges is chairman of the drive with Miss Regina Kennedy, principal of School 25, heading the women's division.

The school is interdenominational and charges tuition based on ability to pay. Tuition provides less than a third of the operating costs.

Key awards were won this week by two pupils of the School of the Holy Childhood and honorable mention received by another in the 15th Regional High School Art Exhibit now on display at Sibley's.

Award winners were Frank DiPasquale, 13, and Edward Shortino, 16. Honorable mention was given Francis Imburgia, 15.

The School of the Holy Childhood has an enrollment of 100 pupils. Serving with the principal, Sister Joseph Andre are Sister Marie Concepts and Sister Marie Martin. In addition six full-time lay teachers are employed, and other persons contribute part-time hours of teaching.

Students ranging in age from 6 to 18 are provided with a three-fold program of social adjustment, vocational training and basic academic subjects.

Students Of Diocese Join Lenten Drive Asked By Pope For World Aid

"Prayers and Dimes," in behalf of the U. S. Bishops' annual Relief Appeal, were asked of the school children in an Ash Wednesday radio broadcast by Pope Pius XII.

The appeal was seconded by a request from His Excellency Bishop Kearney that all seminaries, colleges, high schools and elementary schools of the Rochester Diocese give their Lenten offerings "to aid the needy, homeless and distressed of the world."

A letter voicing the Bishop's request was forwarded this week to all schools and parishes of the Rochester Diocese by the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Charles V. Boyle, diocesan superintendent of schools.

APPEAL BEGAN Ash Wednesday and will extend to Wednesday, April 17.

Last year's returns to the Bishop's Relief Fund Appeal amounted to \$16,411.13 from the schools of the Diocese, mostly contributed in pennies, nickels and dimes in Lenten "mite" boxes.

"The Lenten appeal for Christ's Poor," Monsignor Boyle said, "affords valuable opportunities for developing in our students habits of almsgiving."

The campaign among adults on behalf of the Bishop's Relief Fund will be conducted in parishes throughout the nation on Letare Sunday, March 31.

BOTH CAMPAIGNS are under the auspices of the U.S. Bishops and are conducted annually through their world-wide relief agency, Catholic Relief Service, National Catholic Welfare Conference.

In his radio broadcast, Pope Pius asked the children for their "special prayers all during Lent, that God may grant to all nations that peace and prosperity that will help them to have greater love for him and for their fellowmen."

"Then during Lent," the Holy Father continued, "you will be making so many little sacrifices, giving up some things you like to have; and the dimes you will be saving you will be happy to give to the poor children who have so much less than you have of comfort and care and joy."

'Nation Of Hoodlums' Foreseen In Juvenile Crime Rate Increase

A sharp increase in crime cases involving the 16-21 age group has brought over 200 youthful offenders into Monroe County courts since January 1 -- nearly double the number handled during the entire year of 1956.

Last week alone, 31 youthful offenders were arrested for crimes ranging from car-thefts to larcenies and assault cases.

The Monroe County pattern is reflected generally throughout the other eleven counties of the Rochester Diocese.

Monroe's chief probation officer, Joseph J. McMahon, stated that 13 percent of the offenders claim to be Catholics.

A twenty year old admitted to McMahon, "I haven't been to Mass in years."

PROBATION OFFICE records show that 90 percent of the offenders admit they are not attending church services.

McMahon also said that officers frequently discover youthful offenders come from homes of good parents who wouldn't do wrong themselves but these parents fail to insist on their children living up to religious duties.

In most cases, the parents themselves admit they don't attend church either. "We have to work all week," they tell probation officers checking the homes of youthful offenders.

Probation chief McMahon has been in probation work since 1929 but the soaring crime records of the past two months are the worst he's seen in over twenty five years.

"We are all responsible," he said.

The general breakdown in morality all over has destroyed the sense of right or wrong in the minds of these youngsters," McMahon stated.

HE CITED obscene magazines, "riot" provoking music, lusty movies as part of the cause of youthful crime.

He pointed out also the flagrant disregard for marriage sta-

bility when publicity is given to "stars" who divorce and remarry many times over.

He also cited the disregard of parents for the problems and needs of their children.

"It would tear your heart out," McMahon said, "to see these youngsters—16, 17 years old—at that age already in trouble with the law and not a parent on hand to stand by them."

In his annual report soon to be published, McMahon pinpoints a major portion of the blame on parents.

"Parents are either too callous or disinterested in the problems of their children, and offer no intelligent discussion of these problems," the report states.

"What's the solution?" the probation chief was asked.

"Everybody these days has a solution," the veteran chief smiled. "and I hesitate to add another one."

HE DOES THINK that clergymen—priests, ministers, and rabbis—could perhaps step in where parents fail to live up to parental responsibility.

"If pastors could take the eighth grade boys before they get out of grade school and give them a clear, factual picture of the crime that plagues the teenage reputation, and warn
