GOD LOVE YOU!

"AS THEY HAVE HATED ME, so will they hate you", foretold Our Lord of His priests and faithful. Compare two documents, one of the first century pagan Rome the other of present century Communist China. In both the faithful are outlawed from society, then persecuted. When Nero burned Rome on July 19th in the year 84 the blame fell upon the faithful. Tacitus, the pagan Roman historian called the Christians "the haters of the human race". He also called them execrable which is "deadly". After being set apart from what were called "civilized" people, they were persecuted. Tacitus continues "They were clothed in the skins of wild beasts and torn to pieces by dogs; they were fastened to crosses; they were set up to be burned, so as to serve the purpose of lamps when daylight failed."

BUT IT IS NO DIFFERENT in China today. The Communists start a "patriotic church", the condition of which is the denial of the Holy Father. The Catholics who refuse are called unpatriotic and therefore "enemies of China". Next the persecution. The Propaganda in Rome has just announced that in 1948 there were 5,916 foreign missionaries in China. This does not include the 8,442 priests, Brothers and Sisters who are Chinese. As Nero persecuted them, so Mao-tse tung persecutes now. At the present time there are left only one Bishop, eleven priests and eleven Sisters. Some were killed, most arrested or imprisoned, many tortured and others exiled.

What does that mean to us? If the faithful and the missionaries in China would endure persecution rather than deny the Holy Father, the Vicar of Christ, then shall we not bear their burdens as our own? While our hands hang limp ours can be uplifted in prayer; while they have their lives or their very being, we can offer superfluities or our having. The great service of the Society for the Propagation of the Faith is that all you give to it, goes directly to the Holy Father. At least we can by the love of sacrifice prove we are one with him on whom is the burden of the Church of the world.
