

Franciscan To Speak At K of C Breakfast

Rev. Jerome Kelly, O.F.M., head of the English Province of St. Bonaventure University will be guest speaker at the annual Communion Breakfast for fathers and sons of Rochester Council, Knights of Columbus, Sunday, March 17, according to Grand Knight Donald E. Woerner.

The Knights and their sons will receive Holy Communion at 7:30 a.m. Mass in St. Joseph Church, Franklin St. and breakfast will follow in Columbus Civic Center. General Chairman in City Court Judge Leo M. Minton.

Father Kelly will be presented by County Court Judge Joseph G. Fritsch who will be toastmaster.

The guest speaker, a distinguished member of the Franciscan Order, received his M.A. in education from Catholic University in 1946. He is a graduate of La Salle Academy, Providence and attended St. Joseph Seminary and later St. Bonaventure University where he was awarded his B.A. degree in 1934.

After ordination in 1937, Father Kelly was assigned to the English department at St. Joseph Seminary where he served six years. An instructor and professor of English at St. Bonaventure since 1948 he has the additional responsibility of being head of the University's Evening and Extension School.

The breakfast will be served under the direction of Al Bernardo. Gerald J. Morris heads the ticket committee. Tickets are \$1.25 each.

Notre Dame Professor Set For Nazareth College Talks

Dr. Vincent E. Smith, University of Notre Dame professor of philosophy, will be at Nazareth College, March 22, 23 and 24 for a series of meetings with faculty and students. On Friday, Dr. Smith will speak to two groups of students: at 9:15 a.m. on the philosophy of nature and psychology and at 11:15 a.m. the juniors and seniors on the Catholic college curriculum. At 3 p.m. he will meet the faculty for a discussion on the Catholic college curriculum. This discussion will be continued Saturday morning at which time Dr. Smith will speak on the integrating function of theology and philosophy.

A GROUP of interested faculty will meet Saturday afternoon for a discussion on the philosophy of science, its relation to psychology, biology, chemistry and physics, and the implications for the curriculum in each of these fields.

Dr. Smith has been on the Notre Dame faculty since 1950, and during the past year has been the president of the American Catholic Philosophical Association. A specialist in the philosophy of science, Dr. Smith is the author of several books, including Footnotes for the Atom, Philosophical Physics and Idea Men of Today. He is also the editor of The New Scholasticism. Dr. Smith was the director of a self-study committee whose
